Atlantics Edge Glace Bay 5-4 In Overtime

HALIFAX, (CP)—Bob Bowness, jamming in his rebound as he fell to the ice, gave Halifax Atlantics a 5-4 overtime victory over Glace Bay Miners Friday night in a wide-open Maritime Major Hockey League game.

Set up by Bill Ford and Pete Wywrot, Bowness drilled a sizzling shot at goalie Cliff Hicks and when the puck bounced back he slapped it under Hicks' arm as he fell to the ice with a Miner defenceman on his back. But Bowness had to share star billing with Hugh Campbell, Miners' big winger whose playing made it appear as if he had a personal feud with Halifax goalie Roy McMeekin. Actually the two former teammates are pals.

Campbell gave Miners a 2-1 lead in the first period and forced the game into overtime with the only goal of the third, which came unassisted after a rink-length rush through the Halifax forwards and defence. Ford, Billy Arcand, Ross Watson and Wywrot got Halifax's other goals, and Jim Farrell notched the other Glace Bay goal. Ford's goal was his 76th of the season and his two assists gave him a total of 138 points, 10 more than the record set by Roy (Buck) Whitlock of Charlottetown Islanders while with Saint John Beavers four seasons ago.

Glacé Bay held the edge in shooting and McMeekin had to be spectacular several times in making 42 stops. Hicks made 35 saves. DeMarco Wins Lightweight Championship

by MURRAY ROSE NEW YORK, (AP)—Busting Paddy DeMarco, who appeared headed for boxing's scrap heap only five months ago, put on the greatest fight of his career Friday night to wrest the lightweight championship from 30-year-old Jimmy Carter in a sensational upset in Madison Square Garden. A 44-1 underdog, the 26-year-old DeMarco, who had never gone more than 10 rounds before in his nine-year career, won the 15-rounder with ease. The decision was unanimous and was met with a roar of approval by the slim crowd of 5,730 which paid \$23,727. The broad-shouldered, bow-legged Brooklyn brawler out-hustled, out-fought and out-manoeuvred the hard-hitting New York Negro. Paddy made Carter fight the way he wanted as he piled up points with a flicking left jab, flashing hooks and daring flurries.

Plan Longer Drives For Golf Balls

NEW YORK, (AP)—Now they're applying aerodynamic principles to make your golf drives fly farther. One golf ball manufacturer has come out with a "diamond" cover marking in place of the usual round or square dimples, and promises it will add at least 10 yards to any golfer's drives and that some will get a lot more distance. This marking, said John Sproul, sales manager of golf balls for the United States Rubber Co., was developed by engineers who applied the principles of aerodynamics to get greater lift and carry. The company's tests, he says, have shown that the new cover design makes the ball stay in the air almost a quarter of a second longer.
