An Awful Fate.

The closing of Behring Sea against sealers has doomed three white men to a winter in exile far up in the Arctic and possibly to death. A year ago the Mattie Dyer, a sealing schooner, of San Francisco, left three of her men on St. Mathew's Island, in the northern part of Behring Sea. Sealing was dull and they were given stores and fuel enough for nearly a year, and seventy pounds of powder. They were to hunt blue foxes and polar bears and the Dyer was to take them off in May this year. The Dyer sailed into port Sunday and Captain Charles Mockler declared that by reason of the blockade he had been unable to reach the exiles. It would be too expensive an undertaking, he said, to send a vessel especially to relieve the men. No arrangements have been made for their rescue. Three Indian hunters, who were left on St. Mathew's Island in a similar way a few seasons ago were devoured by polar bears.

Shipping of Montreal.

Those are satisfactory reports about the growth of the shipping trade this year at the port of Montreal. It is not cause for local gratification alone. The indications are that national trade is brisk, and that the export business via the St. Lawrence route, over which Uncle Sam's retaliation threats have no effect, is still increasing. A great deal of Ontario produce goes abroad by that outlet, and when we are told that this year up to date, compared with last year during the same period, the wheat shipments from Montreal are as 3,493,000 bushels to 1,985,000; peas as 907,000 to 394,000; barley 211,000 instead of 63,000; rye 218,000 against 66,000; cheese 88,000 boxes ahead of last year; lumber 3,622,000 pieces compared with 2,094,910, bearing this in mind the trend of trade is seen to be significant. Not much is heard now a-days of the continent to which we belong, for the very good reason that the stern logic of the facts is demonstrating the futility of the argument that the natural and sole market for Canadian farm products was the United States.

News Notes.

Labor is the inevitable lot of the majority, and the best education is that which will make their labor most productive.—Froude.

The London Missionary Society is going to send delegates into Africa to make a special inquiry into the feuds of the English and French missionaries.

A new movement is on foot to open a universal exhibition in Berlin on March 22, 1897, as a special celebration of the centenary of the birth of Kaiser Wilhelm I.

The Hazra rebellion is assuming formidable proportions. The discovery of the Russians among the insurgents is regarded as conclusive proof that Russia is instigating the Hazras to rebellion.

The Cherokee form of marriage is perhaps the simplest and most expressive of any. The man and woman merely join hands over a running stream, emblematic of the wish that their future lives, hopes and aspirations should flow on in the same channel.

The French Republican journals regard the triennial elections as a crushing defeat of the enemies of the republic. The Conservative press argue that the victory was achieved by waverers.

Rothschild's absconding cashier, Rudolph Jaeger, who was caught in Egypt some time ago, pleaded guilty before the Assizes at Frankfurt, and confessed to having stolen over \$400,000 from his employer.

The Ottawa Journal comes to the front with a proposal for compromise on the Manitoba question. The system favored by Archbishop Ireland is the concession which it urges upon the Manitobans, and it feels that what finds favor with that eminent prelate should not be displeasing to the Catholics of Canada.

The Allan company have notified the post office department of their intention to discontinue making Halifax a port of call for their steamers on the route between Montreal and Liverpool via St. John's, the reason being that the amount of freight does not warrant the delay occasioned. The service is only fortnightly.

The corner stone of All Saints Church, at Springhill, N. S., was laid by Bishop Courtney in the presence of a large and brilliant assembly last Tuesday evening. There was a large number of visitors present, including Archbishop Kaulback, Rev. V. E. Harris, W. J. Ancient, Mr. W. C. Harris, architect, of this city, and others. After the ceremony there was a banquet in the parish house. Stirring addresses were delivered by the bishop and others.

Lord Chief Justice Coleridge delivered judgment regarding the right of way in an action in which the plaintiff, a working man, sued the Duke of Rutland, because of the latter's game keepers stopping traffic on the highway, while they were driving grouse. His lordship in delivering judgment said the days of high handed interference with the rights of the people had passed. If the duke could not conduct his without meddling with the right of the public to use the highway, he must select other places to hold battues. The evidence given showed that the gamekeepers knocked the plaintiff down on the highway, and that when the plaintiff complained of this treatment to the duke's son, Lord Edward Manser, the latter replied, "Go to the devil if you are shot your life will be on your own head." This, the lord chief justice said, could not be tolerated from any person, not even a duke's son.

M. O'Sullivan, the all-round champion of America, is 37 years of age. The great turf event for the Australian cup was won a few days ago by Queen Mab. There were only three starters.

Joe Lannon and George Dixon were the rival seconds at a sparring bout at the late sports of the Trimounts of Boston.

The free-for-all race at Souris on Thursday next will have as first prize \$100. There will also be a 2 40 and 2 55 class.

Pneumonia is increasing at Palo Alto. Sport, 2 22, died a few days ago. His owner would not have taken \$20,000 for him.

Jack Gaudaur and Stevenson have been matched to row a race at either Burlington Beach or Orilla between Aug. 12th and 18th for \$500 a side.

Our local men are all ready for the Scottish games on Wednesday next. The all-round emblem will undoubtedly be keenly contested.

Johnny Griffin will do his preliminary training at Lakeside, St. John, for his coming fight with Jimmy Lynch. He will arrive in a day or two.

Corbett is getting into the hardest part of his training, and his trainers are taking every precaution. The curious people of Ashbury Park have been forbidden to approach the training quarters.

Our wheelmen will have a chance to distinguish themselves next Thursday on both ordinary and safety. Let us see how near the winner will come to 2.11, the fastest and world's record for one mile.

Ryan, the sculler, has won the Canadian sculling championship four times. His greatest ambition, however, was to win the American championship, which, it will be remembered, he did a few days ago at Saratoga.

Zimmerman and Fred Osmond, rival American and English champion cyclists, may possibly meet at Hamilton, Ont., this week. The former quickly sent his entry when he heard the Englishman would be present.

Allerton and Lebasco trotted a few days ago for a \$10,000 purse, and the latter won on account of the former's withdrawal owing to lameness. Williams, Allerton's owner, may be out \$100,000 as a result of the injury.

Joe Donohue, who easily vanquished Canada's best skaters last winter, will leave for Europe early this winter so as to get plenty of practice for the races there in December and January. This will likely be his last trip abroad.

In the second match of the cricket series at Halifax, Ottawa vs. Halifax, Umpire Watson, of the Ottawas, practically stole the game from the home team by his rank and disgusting decision. The match was awarded to Ottawa, 171 to 155 runs.

Reports current in New York concerning Sullivan's break in training are denied by his backers and trainers. But there seems to be something in it, as trainer Jim Robinson, of the Manhattans, has gone down to the big fellow's quarters.

O'Reilly, the St. John athlete, is not mentioned in connection with the Trimount handicap sports at Boston, on Thursday last. The time made was surprisingly poor, the quarter being won in 56 3-5 sec., and 2.19 winning the half mile.

What a pity we have not more athletic meetings here each year open to all nationalities. The firemen's tournament was a factor in this line. We certainly have good athletes as any other city, and they should have more encouragement.

What a pity Charlottetown has not a few amateurs to represent her at the annual Maritime Province championship sports, Halifax, St. John, Windsor, Truro, and even Pictou, send their representatives every year. There is no reason why we should not do likewise.

In the National League, Cleveland still holds the premier place, with an average of .772; Boston has jumped to second place, and has .687; Brooklyn is a good third with .632. The reorganized New Yorks are coming with a rush, and are rapidly going towards the top.

When American wheelmen go to England in quest of fame the meets are open to all countries. It is to be hoped that the American Cycling Associations will reciprocate, in view of the proposed visit of Osmond and a team from the National Cycling Club of London.

Malcolm Ford, America's greatest athlete, has nearly exhausted his series of articles on amateur sports, running in Outing for some time.
