TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Destructive Fire at Crapaud.

Thirteen Buildings Burned.

HEAVY LOSS.

Special Despatch to the Examiner.

CRAPAUD, Oct. 10.

A most destructive fire broke out at Crapaud last night at 9 o'clock. It originated in a workshop adjoining a house owned by Joseph W. Sturdy, and occupied by Mr. Farrow and another tenant. It burnt that house, stable, shed and workshop. Lawrence Lacey's house and stable, and James Day's stable then caught on the roof. Thomas H. Brown's dwelling and store were then burnt, with stable and large workshop. Nothing was saved except a few goods from store. Nelson Sturdy's building, used as a store and warehouse, and his stable, were also burnt. The warehouse owned by D. W. Palmer and stable owned by Charles Wright, beside some small buildings, were also consumed. Mr. Trowsdale's loss is the heaviest, being about \$3,000; insurance, \$2,600.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.

A committee has been appointed, composed of Gen. Sherman (chairman), Blaine and Windom, and 23 others, to establish in Washington a National and International Garfield Memorial Hospital, for which popular subscriptions in any sum will be received from the world.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Oct. 7.

Mr. Gladstone arrived at Leeds last evening and was received with the utmost enthusiasm. He addressed a meeting and explained the Liberal foreign policy to consist of two main principles: That every foreign country should be credited with the same good motives as ourselves until it showed the contrary, and that every power was entitled to the same rights and privileges, irrespective of size. There was much to be done in allowing and modifying the land laws of England and Scotland, but the circumstances in these parts are not those of Ireland. He argued that the depression of trade proceeded from decreased purchasing power. If Sir Stafford Northcote disapproved of Mr. Lowther's suggestion of the corn duty, it was time to speak intelligently on the subject. As Sir Stafford Northcote had other speeches to make soon, he perhaps, would say emphatically whether he favored protection and a corn duty. He declared he himself would be no party to a retrograde movement.

"At a banquet, to-night, Mr. Gladstone said justice to Ireland is a sacred duty, but it can never be performed without equal justice to England and Scotland. Ireland is in a great crisis and on the working of the Land Act may depend the greatest issues with regard to her prosperity. Alluding to agrarian crimes, he said we are convinced that the Irish nation desires to take full advantage of the Land Act, but Parnell says no. The Government will rely upon the good sense of the people because it is determined that no force, or fear of force, or fear of ruin through force shall prevent the people from having full and free benefit of the land. I call upon all orders and degrees of men in the three kingdoms to support the Government.

LONDON, Oct. 7.

Mr. Walsh, the Land League delegate from Australia, is forming League branches in Balla. He starts for America in March or April.

Messrs. O'Connor and Redpath were interviewed before their departure from Queenstown. O'Connor said a monster reception would be given to himself and Redpath, Dillon and Egan on their arrival in America. Redpath stated he intends to publish a book in America narrating his experiences. From Ireland it will contain affidavits from every county to the number of fire hundred respecting eviction.

By special invitation, Parnell and the Executive of the Land League Labor Convention will assemble in Dublin at the end of October, for the purpose of forming a national organization of farm laborers to act with and under the direction of the league.

LONDON, Oct. 7.

The British Board of Trade returns for September show a decrease in the value of imports of £1,082,193, and an increase in the value of exports of £873,216, compared with the same month last year.
