

Local and Other Items.

GUY FAWKES.—This is Guy Fawkes Day.

POLITICAL.—Wednesday, November 14, is nomination day in East Northumberland; election on the 21st.

EGGS.—The Sun reports a considerable advance in eggs in the St. John market, with very few coming in.

HOOK & LADDER.—Regular meeting of the Hook and Ladder Co. at 7 o'clock this evening. John T. Heertz, Sec'y.

ASSESSMENT.—The new assessment of Ottawa is \$16,300,000, an increase of two millions, partly from newly annexed territory.

SUPREME COURT.—The Michaelmas Term of the Supreme Court opens in this city tomorrow forenoon. The docket is light.

COLD.—During last night the thermometer registered 30 above zero—two below freezing point. This is the coldest of the season.

THE CROPS.—Late reports state that farm work in the New England States has been very much retarded by inclement weather.

MILITARY.—No. 2 Battery, G. A., will meet for drill at the Shed to-morrow evening, when the members will receive their drill pay for 1888.

REWARD.—The Ontario Government will pay a thousand dollars for information that will lead to the conviction of the Galt candy poisoners.

SHOULD KNOW BETTER.—One of the drunks at the police court this morning said he was seventy-two years of age—old enough to have more sense.

SHOULD TRY AGAIN.—Bates, the Baptist preacher, who predicted that the world would come to an end to-day (Nov. 5) is evidently a little off in his calculation.

AQUATIC.—Teemr and Searle, the present champion of the world, are matched. Searle rowed the "Paranatta" championship course (3 miles and 330 yards) in 19.53 in July last.

MATRIMONIAL.—Michael McCormack, Esq., of Souris, and Mrs. Margaret H. Walker, of Charlottetown, were married at St. Dunstan's Cathedral this morning. The ceremony was performed by His Lordship Bishop McIntyre, assisted by Rev. J. C. McLean. THE EXAMINER extends its hearty congratulations.

SPECIAL SERVICES.—The special services to be conducted by Rev. A. Lowrey, D. D., of New York, assisted by Mrs. Lowrey and others, will commence to-morrow afternoon (Tuesday) at 3 o'clock, in the Second Methodist Church, and in the evening at 7.30. The services will continue during the week. All are cordially invited.

LEADS THE WORLD.—Mr. John Dyke, Government agent at Liverpool, reports a great demand on the Corn exchange for the few samples of Manitoba wheat there. Nine shillings and three pence to nine shillings and six pence per cent. is quoted. The best Californian is only \$8 5/4, and the best Russian, which should compete with the Manitoban, only \$8 3/4.

THE FINAL VOLUME.—The final volume of the new edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica will be published in a few weeks. The work consists of thirty-four volumes, and has taken fourteen years to bring out. Besides the editors, Dr. Robinson Smith and the late Prof. Baynes, 145 contributors have been engaged thereon. The first edition of the Encyclopedia appeared in 1771, and the present issue is the ninth.

OUT OF THE ICE PRISON.—The steam whaler Brasher arrived at San Francisco from the Arctic regions, last Friday. She reports that the thirteen whalers with crews of about 600 men, which were caught in the ice pack the last of September are safe. On October 2, after the vessels had been imprisoned nine days, a gale sprang up and the ice began to break. The whaling captains took the first opportunity to release their vessels, and in a day or two all were safely out of the ice and on their way to the whaling rendezvous.

FOOTBALL.—In the game of football played at Victoria Park on Saturday, between the Abegweits and the St. Dunstan's teams, the latter were victors by a score of two tries to nothing. The Abegweits began play with thirteen, and before their full team had arrived the St. Dunstan's team had secured the only points made in the game. Except as above stated a succession of scrimmages and numerous bloody faces were the features of the game.

CHURCH MUSIC.—The Church Guardian says: "We have received from the Rev. Fred. E. J. Lloyd, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., a specimen copy of his 'Twelve Tunes for Familiar Hymns,' and having tried them can speak most strongly in praise of them. We think every one of them good, and would have difficulty in deciding which of the twelve we prefer. With the exception of the first they are set to Hymns 24; 191; 245; 391; 255; 306; 102; 401; 436; 223; and 332 of Hymns A & M; the first is written for 'The Litany of the Hours,' by E. H. Mitchell. The twelve tunes are issued in pamphlet form by Novello, Ewer & Co., but may be had by addressing the author as above. The price two is reasonable, only 25c post free.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Manitoba Muddle.

OTTAWA, Nov. 2. The railway committee of the Privy Council to-day, decided upon the case to go to the Supreme Court for an opinion on the question whether a railway chartered by the Manitoba Government had power to cross the C. P. R. tracks. Mr. Gormally, representing the railway commissioner of Manitoba, said that gentleman did not now recognize the jurisdiction of the railway committee. His representations were of no avail, Martin having placed himself out of court by asking the committee to sanction the crossing.

Winnipeg, Nov. 2.

The Northern Pacific brought in a special excursion train to-day filled with men. They went on to the crossing. No collision between the two forces has occurred yet, but it is bound to come if the Government carry out their determination.

Balfour Happy.

LONDON, Nov. 2.

Mr. Balfour addressed a Liberal Unionist conference at Wolverhampton to-day. He was jubilant over the Conservative victories in the municipal elections, and said they proved that unionism was progressing. The Unionists were defeating the Gladstonians even in strongholds like Leeds. He said the policy of the government was winning all along the line. Crime in Ireland has been reduced almost to the level of '81. He thought the outcry over evictions absurd. A hundred thousand persons were evicted in New York yearly without comment.

Customs Seizure.

MONTEREAL, Nov. 2.

The customs authorities have detected a series of frauds committed on the department by a commission merchant by means of duplicate invoices. The invoices were used for passing goods which were much below the value of the merchandise entered. The false invoices are said to be at least from thirty to forty per cent. below the real value of the articles. Berlin, the importer, who has had a quantity of liquors imported by him seized by the customs officials here for undervaluation, denies that there was any irregularity in the matter, and says he has been betrayed to the officers by an employe for revenge.

Fatal to Farmers.

READING, Pa., Nov. 2.

This afternoon, on the farm of Jonas Spayd, in Berne township, this county, a steam threshing machine boiler exploded, killing five persons and injuring many more. The bodies of all five killed were hurled 50 feet and terribly mutilated. The barn was completely wrecked, and the force of the explosion was felt for miles.

Sent to Washington.

LONDON, Nov. 2.

Hon. Michael Henry Herbert has been appointed British charge d'affaires at Washington. Lord Sackville will come to England immediately on leave of absence. It is understood the government will allow the case to rest until after the presidential election.

Four of his fellow-conductors, with the assistance of Joe Edwards, of the Windsor and Annapolis railway, came to her relief by collecting \$193.80, which they presented to her recently.
