Montreal Canadiens' goalie Jacques Plante is very much disappointed over his failure to land a berth on the first All-Star team. Plante was named to the second team but Glen Hall of the lowly Black Hawks grabbed the netminder's position on the first team.

Plante was about the unluckiest guy you could find last winter. He had the flu, asthma, a concussion, another asthma attack and finally now he's in hospital where work is being done on his damaged nose.

When Jacques heard someone wondering what would have happened had he enjoyed a full share of health, he bitterly replied, "In these words: 'Probably I would have been voted to the third team.'"

His disappointment rather than bitterness that is bothering Plante. He says he doesn't know what a guy has to do to win. He concludes with "It would have been better if I had been beaten by 40 points rather than four."

His disappointment is certainly understandable.

New York Yankees' Bob Turley seems headed for his greatest year in the majors.

Turley racked up win number five on Wednesday, a brilliant 1-0, four hit job on Baltimore Orioles. It was Turley's third shut-out and gave him an earned run average of 1.

Each year Yankees come up with some hurler who far exceeds what was expected of him. Last year it was Bobby Shantz the pint-sized moundsman who many insisted was all through. Bobby disappointed the wise guys by chalking up 11 wins and tasting defeat only five times.

Turley came from Baltimore along with Don Larsen a few years back. He never quite achieved the great things that were predicted of him at the time of the trade. Now when he has been a wee bit forgotten by the experts Bob is up and throwing in a fashion that has baffled in a daze. He continues his amazing feat by battling averages of opposing players take a bad trimming.

His partner, Don Larsen, is also away to a flying start. He has not allowed a run in the last 23 innings and is endeavouring to prove to the Yankees that his perfect game in the 1956 World Series against Brooklyn Dodgers was no fluke. At present he hasn't been beaten and has already three wins to his credit.

If these two gentlemen keep up the pace they are now setting, the New Yorkers are very likely to win the 1958 pennant in a walk.

So indications point to a most interesting football season and it is hoped the fans will turn out in better numbers than they did in 1957.

But even if they may forget one of the really remarkable aspects of Spahn's record.

"Because there was some shooting going on that required his attention, he didn't get around to winning his first big league game until the ripe old age of 25.

"That was 13 years, 456 ball games and 230 victories ago".

## DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

The racing season opens at Halifax, Moncton and Saint John on Monday afternoon, May 19. We understand that the events will be half-mile dashes, and we look to see some fast times, particularly at Sackville Downs, as horses have been stepping in better than 1.04 over the Commons track. It will be interesting to see how the horses from the James MacGregor stable will stack up against those that have been performing on the Halifax Commons track.

Never in the history of the Charlottetown track have so many horses been assembled for spring training. Monday's count showed over 160, and the management has applications for stalls for about 20 more.

The Charlottetown Riding Club stables are filled up, also all the available stalls inside the track fence, and two stables have been fitted up outside in addition to the two that were used last year. These have very nice stalls, and are very desirable, particularly for the summer's racing, so that no complaints are being heard from anyone who has been allotted stable room.

The track is splendid with plenty of surface, and is being watered twice daily. The fastest mile performed over it so far was when the pacer Minnepolis, 2.10 3-5, paced in 2.15 4-5 in company with two others from the James MacGregor stable last Saturday afternoon.

WELL BRED John P. Kehoe, Carleton Siding, one of the most enthusiastic horsemen in Prince County was delighted the other morning when his splendidly bred brood mare, Joan Baker (reg. no. 9228) by Worthy J., 2.10 1-4 by Guy Axewoody, 2.08 1-4, presented him with a beautiful foal sired by Simcoe Harvester, 2.04 1-4.

We are glad to note that the pacer, Captain Wright, 2.03 last night at Blue Bonnets Raceway, time 2.06 4-5. He is being cared for by Archie Lewellyn, formerly of Montague, and was driven by Harold McKinley.

The event was \$6,350. Alouette Pace, and we have no doubt that our friend, Archie, got a tremendous thrill when he saw Captain Wright nosing out Lady's Lad in the last few strides. Lady's Lad has a record of 2.04 2-5 and has won over \$17,000 up to December, 1957.

Racing will conclude at Rockingham Park, Salem, New Hampshire tonight. In the years from 1912 to 1915, it was part of the Grand Circuit chain of tracks, and at one meeting there, they had over 40,000 admissions. It is adapted for both trotters and pacers, and also for runners. Some changes, of course, have to be made when the runners take over, as well as when the trotters and pacers take over.

A PLUNGER Those like the writer, who can remember the stock market days and events of 1904, '05, will recall the fabulous plunger, John (Beicha-A-Million) Gates, who with other millionaire associates, built the track. It continued on for runners after harness racing discontinued, but last year parties connected with Foxboro decided to make it available for harness racing.

In the above, we overlooked the fact that in the years from 1933 to 1936, the track was leased by Allan J. Wilson, formerly of Cardigan, P.E.I., now one of the

principal citizens of Boston, Mass., for harness racing. He popularized the "dash" and eliminated the old fashioned heats in his 1933 events, and this was continued for the succeeding years. Grand Circuit racing was held there under Mr. Wilson's auspices, and later, in 1935, the famous ex-wrestler, Paul Bowser, took over the track. Mr. Bowser is now one of the principal owners of Suffolk Downs Raceway.

On next Monday the pari-mutuels will be ringing, and this year it is expected that last year's record of \$5,512,554 in the Maritimes will be exceeded, and also that the figure of \$52,044 which was paid out to the horse owners in prize money, will be surpassed by upwards of \$100,000.

The Charlottetown track is offering considerably more money in purses, and no doubt this trend will be followed all along the line.

POPULAR COUPLE One of the most popular husband and wife teams whose life interest consists almost entirely in performances of the trotters and pacers and their campaigns, is Dorothy and Bill Haughton.

Dorothy has been a great help in furthering the advancement of her husband who is now the leading money-winning driver in the world, and has been for the past six years. For the past five years, he has won more races than any harness horse driver in America.

A newspaper clipping shows them holding one of their biggest money-winners, Dottie's Pick, .1.56 4-5, and describes them as one of the handsomest, and surely one of the nicest couples in the business. Haughton probably earns about \$200,000 a year, and NEVER bets on a horse. They have a home in Florida, and one in Long Island. He owns shares and parts of horses, which add up to eleven animals. Dorothy owns two, outright.

Recently "Market Wise" won a race and a buzz swept through the stands when the announcer said "Market Wise" owned by Mrs. William R. Haughton and driven by Jimmy Jordan". Quite frequently, Billy Haughton turns one of his string over to Jimmy Jordan. No doubt he, like other drivers, finds that driving several horses in one night is quite a strain, particularly when you are carrying the hopes of many thousands of bettors on your skill in driving the horse you drive to the wire first.

PROMISING MATERIAL The stable of J. Harry Breen, Halifax, has moved into the Charlottetown track under the care of Johnny Jewell. They are J. H. Pointer; Lacey's Larry; and Mr. Wray. There is some promising material there, and we expect that Mr. Jewell will give them records this year.

Another member of the stable is Blue Mary, p. 2.10, that is eligible to the 2.20 Class. Mr. Breen has owned some of the best trotters and pacers that have ever campaigned in the Maritime Provinces; he was a great friend of the late alderman Frank Adams, and each had stables that won many of the top honors at Charlottetown, Halifax, and other raceways.

YONKERS TABS Yonkers Raceway, now under reconstruction, has purchased the new and revolutionary Ampex Video tape recorder that will instantaneously reproduce a perfect picture of every race so that the judges can immediately determine whether any type of

four has been committed. In addition, the call of the race will be recorded on the same tape for better identification. The cost of installing this unusual device will be approximately \$100,000.

After Rockingham Park's races are concluded tonight, the stables there will ship to Cumberland, Maine, where a two weeks program will be held. After that they go to the three weeks session at Lewiston, Me. The Bay State Raceway at Foxboro opens the night of June 16. Racing at the Charlottetown track will, on Saturday night, June 7, and the greatest array of trotters and pacers in racing history in this province is being given workouts over the oval.

The "Mounties" will be in action at three Maritime tracks holding races on Monday, taking saliva tests of winners and one other horse in each class. These will be sent to headquarters for analysis, and we are confident they will prove "negative". Tracks should use every effort to prevent parties other than those in control of the horses from racing rooms having access to the stables on race night. The finding of a positive test would result in serious consequences to the owner and driver of the horse.

NEW YORK (CP)—Four Canadian craft are among a record 121 yachts entered in the annual Newport to Bermuda race June 14.

Yachts from England, Uruguay, Argentina, Bermuda, Cuba and the Virgin Islands as well as the U.S. and Canada will take part in the event organized by the Cruising Club of America.

The distance is 635 nautical miles from the Rhode Island city to the Atlantic Island.

Representing Canada are the 58-foot yawl Pickle, the Royal Canadian Navy contender from Halifax that also took part in the 1956 race; Fairwyn, a 43-foot yawl opened by Charles E. MacCullough of Halifax; Pomadour, the 55-foot yawl of Jack Kent Cooke of Toronto; and Ralkara, a schooner owned by Commodore W. N. Greer, a retired Royal Navy officer now living at Chester Basin, N.S.

Carleton Mitchell's 38 1/2-foot yawl Finisterre will be defending the Bermuda trophy she won last year for the best overall corrected time in the handicap race.

# Tim Tam Heavy Favorite To Win Preakness Today

BALTIMORE (AP)—Tim Tam, boasting seven straight victories, will bring the best record into the Preakness since the great Count Fleet in 1943—but he still has 11 rivals in the rich three-year-old classic at old Pimlico today.

The Kentucky Derby winner and pride of Mrs. Gene Markey's Calumet Farm is the favorite to collect a record sixth Preakness this afternoon for the Lexington, Ky. racing empire. Calumet is tied with G. L. Lorillard, who won five from 1878-1882.

If Tim Tam can whip Jewel's Reward, Silky Sullivan, Lincoln

and the others, the sleek dark bay son of Tom Fool will be the first Derby winner to repeat in the Preakness since 1946. Ten years ago it was Calumet's great thoroughbred—Citation—who swept the Derby-Preakness-Belmont triple crown. Seven of the horses who chased Tim Tam home at Louisville are here, a record number from the Derby.

There were no surprises Friday when the owners forked over \$500 for each of the dozen horses officially entered for the mile and three-sixteenths event.

Another \$500 is due for each horse starting in the race, due

to go off at approximately 6:45 p.m. ADT. The event will be carried on national television and radio (CBS) from 6:30-7 p.m.

BRIGHT WEATHER Weatherman smiled, and brief showers of Thursday night merely dampened the track. It was sunny and warm Friday. Day is more of the same with the temperature in the upper 70s.

In addition to Tim Tam, others in the Preakness entry box are Jewel's Reward and Liberty Ruler, from Mrs. Elizabeth N. Graham's Maine Chance Farm; Mrs. Anthony Cannuli's Chance II Tony; Mrs. Ada L. Rice's Tal-

ent Show; Edward Potter, Jr., Pilon; Michore, from Walter E. Crisimer's P.O. w. Han Farms; Tom Ross and Phil Kipstein's Silky Sullivan; Neoureddin of the Crabgrass Stable of Dr. Peter Graffagnino; Mr. and Mrs. George Lewis' Martins Rullah; Lincoln Road, owned by Sunny Blue Farm of Isaac Lubner; and G. M. Fishin, representing the Llangollen Farm of Mrs. M. E. Lunn.

All will carry 126 pounds, same as in the Derby. Tim Tam's odds were cut from 7 to 5 to 6 to 5 Friday, and might be even money when jockey Ismael Valenzuela walks him into the starting gate. Jewel's Reward, finished fourth as the better Derby favorite, and Liberty Ruler are 3 to 1.

At 9 to 2 in Lincoln Road, who led Tim Tam in the Florida Derby and then the Kentucky Derby, finishing second by half a length both times.

# Yanks Clobber Senators; White Sox Upset Indians

WASHINGTON (AP)—Ed (Whitey) Ford continued his mastery over Washington Senators as he beat them for the 11th straight time over a four-season span, the Yankees winning 7-2 Friday night before 21,023 spectators at Griffith Stadium.

The chunky blond lefthander held the second-place Senators to eight hits and fanned five.

It was Ford's third victory of the season and his second over Washington. Not since September 20, 1954, have the Senators beaten him. He holds a 17-3 lifetime advantage over the Washington club.

In the sixth, Gil McDougald connected for a two-run homer and the Yankees were on the way.

Pascual, absorbing his third defeat of the season, fanned five

before he was chased and tied Cleveland's Herb Score for the American League's strikeout lead, each with 33.

With their victory, the Yankees increased their American League lead to five games over the sagging Senators.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The six-hit pitching of Sad Sam Jones and a two-run homer by Stan Musial, the league's leading hitter, gave St. Louis Cardinals a 2-0 victory Friday night over the last-place Los Angeles Dodgers. Jones struck out nine.

It was the eighth triumph in nine games for the Cardinals, fighting to offset a miserable start this season.

Musial's game-winning home run came in the sixth off Johnny Podres, who held the Cards to four hits in the six innings he worked.

Eddie Kasko, who took over second when Don Blasingame of the Cards was ejected from the game in the first inning, delivered a leadoff double, setting the stage for Musial's seventh home run of the year. Musial's drive went over the right field wall into Grand Avenue.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Harry Anderson's inside the park home run and a circuit clout by Stan Lopata backed up southpaw Curt Simmons' six-hit pitching Friday night as Philadelphia Phillies defeated Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-2.

Anderson's homer came in the first with Richie Ashburn aboard. Lopata's was a solo clout deep into the upper left field stands in the second inning.

Bill Mazeroski accounted for both Pirate runs. In the second he singled home Frank Thomas. In the seventh, Mazeroski's fly to Ashburn in center brought home R. C. Stevens.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Left-hander Billy Pierce, a 20-game winner the last two seasons, picked up his first victory of the 1958 campaign Friday night with a steady six hitter as Chicago White Sox whipped Cleveland in-

dians 6-3 in the opener of a four-game series.

Two of the hits Pierce yielded were solo homers by Bobby Avila and Minnie Minofo.

Ten men batted for the White Sox in the first inning as they popped on Cleveland starter Don Ferrarese for five runs.

Chicago added another run in the second.

The Indians scored a run in the second when Dick Brown went all the way to second on Luis Aparicio's wild throw on a grounder to short and tallied on Lou Carrasquel's single.

Avila's fifth inning homer, his second of the season, cut the margin to 6-2. Minofo hit his fifth homer of the year in the eighth.
