ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL ISLANDER HEARD FROM

Boston Portrait Painter's Discovery.

(New York Journal.)

To the brains and perseverance of a Boston portrait painter is due a discovery which will do much to obviate a very annoying defect in old and valuable portraits which fade with time and lose all dash and vigor of likeness in a few years after painting. It is the secret of P. Edwin Duffy how to get this mixture of pigment and color which will preserve for all time any portrait which he paints. Combined with this valuable feature of Mr. Duffy's pictures is that of his great talent which has brought before his eyes many of the great men of modern times. Some of his subjects in Boston have been ex-Commissioner Fitzgerald, the late Governor Russell and Butler, Chief Justice Parmenter, ex-Mayors Matthews and O'Brien, Mayor Quincy, Consul General Osborne, the Hon. P. A. Collins, P. H. Carroll, the Rev. Denis O'Callaghan and ex-Police Commissioner White. In 1890 Mr. Duffy went abroad and painted portraits of Michael Davitt, Charles Stewart Parnell, Justin McCarthy and William B. Gladstone.

Mr. Duffy was born in Fort Augustus, near Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, in 1869, but has lived in Boston nearly all his life. He commenced the study of portrait painting when 22 years old, and is much devoted to his profession. Many of his paintings adorn City Hall, where he has a host of friends and admirers. By his amiable disposition and unobtrusive demeanor he worked his way from the bottom rung of the ladder of fame, until at the present time he stands in the front rank of his profession.

LETTER FROM MR. McPHAIL.

SIR,—Through the medium of your widely circulated paper I wish to protest, most emphatically against the injustice done to the officials of the Hospital for Insane, as shown in your issue of this morning, wherein is contained a resolution moved at the regular meeting of the City Council last night by Councillor Nicholson, condemning the management of the Asylum unheard.

I respectfully ask a discerning public to withhold their judgement until an impartial and independent investigation is held, which I understand will shortly take place.

I have no hesitation in saying, that so far as the general management is concerned, the inmates at Falconwood are better cared for and more kindly treated than they ever were before. I will not enter into details now, pending an investigation, which I do hope and trust will not be a one-sided one, but which will take cognizance under oath of all matters pertaining to each department of the institution; viz: the immediate care of the patients by attendants, the food supply, the heating apparatus, the sanitary conditions, supervisor's department, and last but not least the medical department.

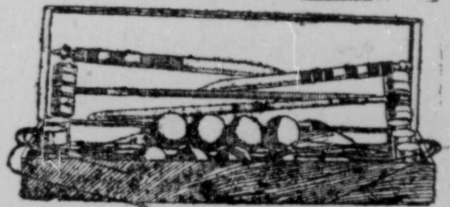
