Local and Other Items.

THE BUTLER CO.—The W. J. Butler Dramatic Company—the company that were unable to come here—are now playing in Halifax. The Herald describes them as "a fine all round company."

TENNIS IN TRURO.—Tennis just now is booming in Truro, N. S. A days "progressive tennis" is being arranged, with "King" and "Booby" courts. A match has also been arranged with the Amherst Tennis Club to be played next week.

TOURISTS.—Many of the seacoast towns are crowded with visitors, the result of the work done by the various tourist associations in the provinces. This means some thousands of dollars put in circulation, and as a consequence an increase of business in these various localities.—Exchange.

THE POLINO.—The Polino arrived here yesterday morning at 5.30. She brought a large cargo and had a full list of round trip passengers. Several offerings from this port had to be refused. She sailed in the afternoon, her outgoing cargo consisting of 10 horses, 50 cattle, 100 sheep and a quantity of hay and oats, and potatoes and other vegetables.

POINT SHIRLEY CLUB.—Last Friday's Boston Herald gives a full description of the opening on Wednesday of the Point Shirley Club. This club is composed of Boston gentlemen who wished for a sea side resort within easy access of Boston. A meeting was held in the Parker House on April 29th, to organize and on July 13, their elegant new quarters were opened. A fairly good cut of the first president of this club, Henry W. Patterson, well and favorably known here heads the article. With such a gentlemen at its head and such a location as Point Shirley for its rooms success is assured.

STRAWBERRIES.—Between June 27th and July 15th, Halifax imported from the Annapolis Valley, 163,700 boxes of strawberries. This means a little over four boxes for every man, woman and child in the city. The lowest price was six cents a box and the average eight. The season practically ended on the 15th and for more than a week from that date, P. E. Island might be supplying the whole market, because our strawberries come in considerably later than those of Nova Scotia. In this connection we might note that the Princess took over yesterday morning 120 boxes and this morning 180 boxes.

ST. JOHN'S NAVAL BALL.—The St. John's N.H.L. Herald says:—The arrangements for the ball in honor of Admiral Bedford are well under way; a fund to cover the expenses will be provided by a number of leading city gentlemen, while the whole management of the affair will be taken over by a committee of ladies. The ball will be held in the British Hall Thursday night week. Other entertainments are said to be in prospect, including a dinner and garden party at government house, a smoking concert in the T. A. Hall and a cricket match at Pleasantville, with probably an afternoon "at home" on the flagship.

IN HALIFAX.—Mr. A. G. Kaiser, of Halifax is building a large new business block in that city. It is situated on Barrington Street, opposite St. Paul's Church. The Halifax Herald of July 17th, describing this building says: "The street front is to be constructed of Halifax County grey granite, treated in bell rock face blocks, having window sills and arch stones of bluish grey granite from Nietaux, similar to the beautiful material in the Sir John Thompson monument erected at Holy Cross cemetery by Griffen & Keleit. Glistening rock faced with white marble, with Cape Breton, and English bluff brick will also be used in the design and the arrangement of color will be harmonious and bright. W. C. Harris, A. R. C. A., of this city, who is a brother of the president of the Royal Canadian Academy of Art in Montreal, is the architect. A few years ago Mr. Harris won the competition prize of \$300 for the best architectural design produced in Canada for the board of trade building in Montreal, and it is hoped Mr. Harris will be equally successful as a new resident, but an old friend, of Halifax."
