CONTRACT BRIDGE

FAMOUS HANDS

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

Bridge hand table with North and South cards listed.

The bidding: South West North East 1 ♠ 1 ♥ Dbie. 1 ♠ Pass Pass INT Pass Pass 2 ♠ Pass 3 ♠ Pass

Opening lead—king of spades. There is one play in bridge you don't find covered in textbooks. It is known as the Alcatraz Coup.

The Alcatraz Coup, naturally enough, had its origin in Alcatraz. Who the genius was that invented it is now in dispute.

The first recorded use of the play occurred in the accompanying hand. After winning the spade

lead, West shifted to a heart and East ruffed. Back came the deuce of clubs (this was not an honest return—it was the fifth best club).

West took the ace and led another heart, which East ruffed. East now played a club, taken in dummy. Declarer had lost four tricks and needed the rest to make the hand.

The king of diamonds was led, followed by another diamond, and East produced the ten. The critical point was now at hand.

South took stock. East had a shown up with no hearts. His distribution was likely to be 5-4-4, but had he started with five diamonds or only four? If East held five diamonds originally, the finesse was essential, but if East held only four, the ace would be the proper play.

South came to a decision. He played the ace of hearts on the diamond lead. West didn't bother to look and automatically played his queen of diamonds.

South now corrected his planned ruff, substituted the ace of diamond for the ace of hearts, and thus made the contract. Of course, such shenanigans are strictly dishonest, and players who indulge in such tactics inevitably become ostracized.

In fact, the Alcatraz Coup is now forbidden even on The Rock, the penalty is solitary confinement.

Canadians Encouraged To Invest In U. S. Subsidiaries

WASHINGTON (CP)—A tax convention designed to promote greater Canadian stock ownership in U.S. corporations operating in Canada was put into effect Thursday by Canada and the United States.

Up to now, U.S. corporations in Canada paid an income tax of only five per cent on Canadian dividends in cases where 95 per cent of the controlling stock was held in the U.S.

Under the new arrangement, the five-per-cent tax rate will apply to subsidiaries in cases where 51 per cent of the controlling stock is held in the U.S.

This would permit U.S. corporations to open 49 per cent of their stock to Canadian ownership and still be entitled to the low tax rate. Ordinarily, the tax rate on dividends is 15 per cent.
