MORTUARY STATISTICS.—We are indebted to Dr. Johnson, Health Officer, for the following mortuary statistics of the City of Charlottetown for the month of November, 1890: Number of death, 12; same month last year, 18. Causes of death—bronchitis 1; Enteritis 1; pyemia 1; heart disease 2; Bright's disease 1; dropsy; consumption 1; old age 3; not known 1. Age at death—3 days 1, 7 years 1, 23 years 1, 43 years 1, from 62 to 78 years 7, at 90 years 1. Average age at death, 55 11-12 years. Religion—Protestant 8, Catholic 4. Nationality—English 4, Scotch 2, Irish 4, French 1, Dutch 1. Sex—males 8, females 4.

FAVORABLE RESULTS.—The New Haven, Conn., Palladium says: "A small package of Professor Robert Koch's lymph was received in this city yesterday direct from Heidelberg by Professor Russell H. Chittenden, in charge of the Yale biographical laboratory. Professor J. C. P. Foster administered the dose by a hypodermic syringe to a patient suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis. The dose was half the minimum dose recommended by Dr. Koch. The reaction noted in cases abroad was immediately observable, though faintly owing to the small injection."

THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION.—This feast was observed in the usual way at the Convent de Notre Dame last evening. The grand hall of that institution was well filled, and the temporary altar erected therein was beautifully decorated. Solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was given by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald, who also preached an excellent sermon. After Benediction, eleven young ladies were admitted members of the society of the children of Mary. The convent choir was assisted on the occasion by Miss W. H. H. and Prof. Caven; and Mother Benoit playing the harp and Miss Macdonald the violin. Both singing and playing was, of course, excellent. A collection was taken up at the close.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

UNPRECEDENTED GALES

Damage to Shipping.

HALIFAX, Dec. 8.

A despatch from Port Hawkesbury says the gales the past week are unprecedented in the history of that harbor, more casualties occurring in these few days than during the last thirty years. At five o'clock this morning the Bertie C. H. collided with the Annie Gates, with produce from P. E. Island. The Mair Euphroene, which had been floated and was drifting toward the head of the harbor, collided with the Bertie C. H. The schooner Nettie N. G. drifted from her moorings and now lies stranded on the shore. There were several minor disasters, much of the trouble caused by the vessels not being carefully moored. The Alpha arrived from Bermuda to-day and reports bad weather all the way up. A gale which passed over Jamaica and Bermuda laid a vast amount of damage, and Bermuda papers pronounce it the worst in ten years.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.

Sir Charles Tupper cabled to-day that the cargo of the Coran has been released, as the supposed existence of pleuro-pneumonia was not verified.

A Glasgow engineer and Vancouver capitalists are here promoting a scheme for a graving dock at Vancouver.

A prominent shipper from this district in an interview to-night, states that eggs, poultry and lamb, in which he deals, now net him as much in the American market as they did before the McKinley Act came into force.

The Cattle Trade.

MONTRÉAL, Dec. 8.

An emergency meeting of cattle shippers was held to-day to consider the grave state of trade with England. Sir Charles Tupper having cabled to the department at Ottawa that certain steamers were debarred from further carrying cattle, and that strong opposition was coming from English agriculturists, it was decided to send Dr. MacEachern, Government Inspector, to England, to strengthen the high commissioners' hands in the light he is making for this great Canadian industry. A delegation was also named to confer with the members at Ottawa.

An Embezzler Gets Free.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.

Mrs. Cornelia V. E. Miller, charged with receiving \$132,000 alleged to have been embezzled by J. M. Field & Co. of London, whose extradition was sought by the British Consul, was discharged to-day by United States Commissioner Shields.

Another Great Bridge.

NIAGARA FALLS, Dec. 8.

A party of engineers from Montreal are striking a line for a new bridge across the gorge at a point between this village and the suspension bridge. It is thought they are working in the interests of the Canadian Pacific.

Murder Most Foul.

CARP, Ont., Dec. 8.

One of the oldest residents, R. Langford, was found murdered in his barn to-day. The victims was 80 years of age.
