### Former Souris Man Improves

A former Souris man now residing in Roxbury, Mass., Joseph A. MacDonald, has fully recovered from serious injuries he received several weeks ago when struck by a car on a Roxbury street.

MacDonald, 34, is a son of Mrs. Alex P. MacDonald of Souris, P.E.I. He attended St. Dunstan's University from 1940 to 1945, and has been a resident of the Boston area for the last several years.

In the above accident MacDonald suffered a fractured skull, fractures of both knees and internal injuries. The car that struck him first caromed off a parked auto; the driver of the vehicle was taken into custody.

The accident took place in front of Intercolonial Hall, Roxbury, a few minutes after the conclusion of a concert held to raise money for the Springhill Disaster fund. Mr. MacDonald was co-chairman of the Springhill drive in the Boston area, along with Bennett MacInnis of Cambridge, Mass., a native of St. Peter's Bay.

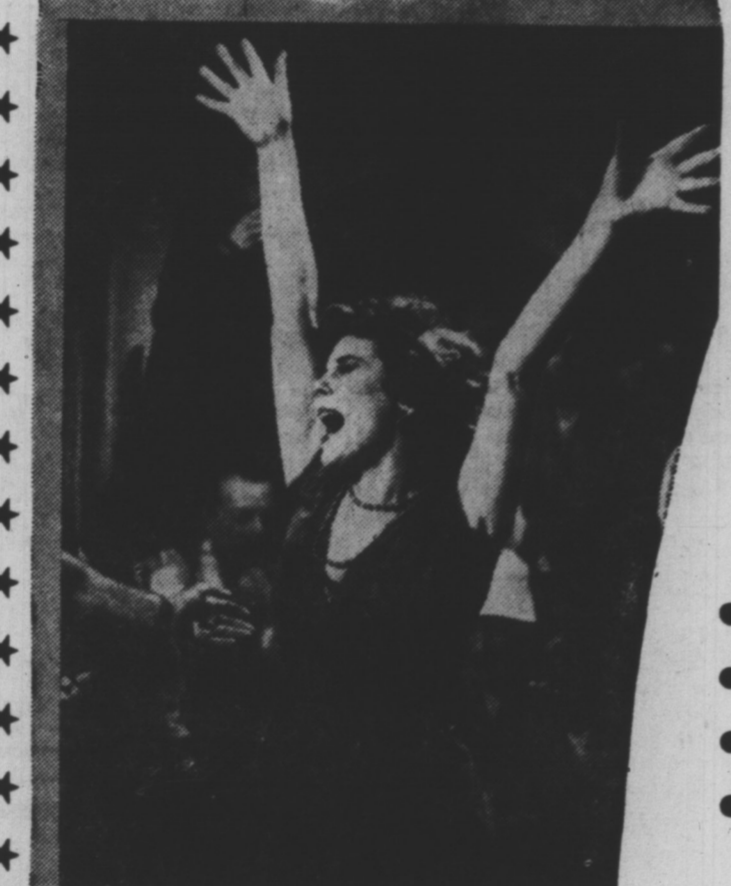
