## BARBECUED BEANS WITH SAUSAGE MEAT BALLS

1 1/2 lb. dry kidney beans  
12 tsp. salt  
2 tsp. salt  
1/2 c. fine-chopped peeled onion  
1/2 c. onion powder  
3 tsp. cooking oil  
2 (16-oz.) cans tomato sauce  
1/2 tsp. elder vinegar  
1 to 2 tsp. chili powder or hot sauce  
1/4 c. Tabasco

Sausage meat balls (recipe follows)  
Soak beans with boiling water. Cover. Let stand 10 min. Add salt and boil 1 1/2 hrs. or until beans are almost soft. Add more water if they get too dry.

Meantime, mix onion and garlic powder in a bowl. Drain beans, stir in tomato sauce, vinegar, chili powder.

Combine with beans. Simmer 1 1/2 hrs., when beans should be tender and most of liquid absorbed.

Fifteen minutes before beans are done, add sausage meat balls.

To serve: Spoon bubbling-hot barbecued beans into large shallow casserole. Top with sizzling hot meat balls. Reheat if necessary. Dant with minced parsley.

NOTE: The use of 4 (16-oz.) cans red kidney beans and their liquid instead of cooking dry

kidney beans, costs more, but saves 3 hrs. time!

## SAUSAGE MEAT BALLS

Combine and mix 1/2 lb. sausage meat, 1/2 lb. ground beef, 1/4 c. milk, and 1/4 tsp. each salt and pepper. Shape into marble-size balls. Bake about 4 min. or until lightly browned in cooking oil or butter.

## CHRISTMAS FLOWER CRACKERS FROM THE CHEF

Mesdames: A few of these "white" touches to a plate of appetizing cookies, or festive "eye-pieces" for topping cookies destined for gifting.

THE INGREDIENTS: 1 c. room-temperature butter or margarine, 1 tsp. vanilla, 1 c. granulated sugar, 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder, 1/4 tsp. salt, 3 c. sifted flour, 2 eggs, beaten light; 1 egg-white (slightly beaten); 25 candied cherries, halved and cut into 5 sections; small, hard yellow candied citron sliced thin; 1/2 cup of red candies (to simulate holly berries).

Stir in vanilla and sugar together until smooth, sift to gether sugar, baking powder, flour and add alternately with beaten eggs. Mix until well-blended, making stiff dough. Cover. Refrigerate an hour or more.

On the 2nd day, roll out on a 12" square of waxed paper or aluminum foil, shape into a long roll about 2" in diameter. Wrap up snugly. Refrigerate at least an hour, or until needed (up to 2 weeks).

To bake and decorate: Slice dough into thin rounds with this knife. Place the cookies on a slightly oiled baking sheet

## New Year's Eve Party Can Cost \$50 Couple

Canadians wishing to celebrate the arrival of the New Year will have the choice of attending a party at home or spending up to \$50 a couple on entertainment and dinner at a night spot.

A cross-Canada survey by The Canadian Press shows that prices range from \$10 to \$25 in some Montreal hotels and up to

\$30 in Toronto. Most prices include dancing and dinner but exclude drinks.

While many Canadians plan house parties, Quebec residents will be without "take-home" liquor due to a strike of liquor board employees.

Many are expected to go to Ontario or nearby United States to spend New Year's Eve. However, Quebec hotels and bars say they are not running short of liquor.

In Halifax, prices for an evening out range from \$15 to \$20 and dances are usually crowded. Hotels say they are booked full well in advance.

Resorts in Halifax harbor add to the New Year's Eve noise by welcoming the New Year with loud blasts on fog horns and other whistles. Police say "pretty wet" night but don't plan any special patrols to catch drinking drivers unless weather or other factors warrant.

## HOUSE PARTY POPULAR

Saint John prices for downtown dancing and dining range up to \$12 but house parties are always popular in the New Brunswick port city.

Midnight movies at \$1 a person are also popular. No special events are planned.

In Montreal, the liquor strike may force many people away from house parties. Those who do more lavish evenings could be

had at the Queen Elizabeth Hotel which offers a six-course meal, dancing and entertainment for \$25. Police are planning special patrols.

In Ottawa, the only major suspect club, the Chateau Laurier Grill, is just about sold out for New Year's Eve with \$15 a person the charge and comedian Rich Little the headline entertainment.

Police say no extra men will be on duty during the holiday but that drinking drivers can expect no mercy.

Governor-General Vanier will hold a New Year's Eve. A night out in Winnipeg costs from \$12 to \$20 and nightclubs are booked solid.

Entertainment in Regina ranges from dining and dancing, at from \$10 to \$20 a couple.

## CRACKERS WARNED

Night spots and house parties are also popular in Edmonton with a night on the town costing up to \$25. Car clubs, which in previous years, have operated drive-home services for drinking drivers, have been advised by the Alberta Motor Association to drop the practice.

The AMA says a driver could lose his license or get into a lawsuit in case of an accident where there was no insurance coverage.

The most popular entertainment in Calgary is an evening on the town with prices running up to \$19 a couple.

In Vancouver, it will be the first of two New Year's celebrations, with perhaps the most colorful to come Feb. 2 when "The Year of the Snake" will be ushered in in the Chinatown district.

Priest for Jan. 1 celebrations range up to \$15 a couple with many residents preferring to stay at home.

## Tanker, Liner Claims Vary On Speed Fog Before Crash

NEW YORK (AP)—A spokesman for owners of the Norwegian tanker cut in two by the Israeli liner Shalom Nov. 26, said the tanker "was practically dead in the water when the Shalom, at top speed, knifed into her."

The representative also claimed the Shalom's officers would not know there was fog ahead if they had been watching her radar.

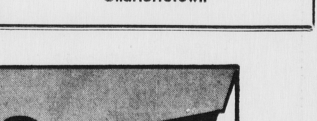
