Opening lead—three of spades.

For sheer beauty in the art of defense it is hard to top this exhibit. Central figure in the classic was the West Coast Star, Barry Crane. He held the West cards in a pair championship some years back.

The contract—one notrump doubled—was not terribly exciting, though in duplicate the difference between defeating declarer one trick or two can be very important. Barry set his sights on a two-trick set.

Declarer won the suade in dummy and led the jack of clubs, which Crane allowed him to win. The ten of clubs also held. When the nine was led and overtaken

by the queen, Crane again permitted South to win the trick!

Declarer, with six tricks in sight, now tried to build up another trick. He led a diamond. Barry played low—he was hiding his time for the eventual kill and East won the ten with the ace. East returned a spade. South took it and led another diamond. The time had finally come for Barry to strike. He won with the king, and this became the position.

On re, at long last, cashed his ace of clubs and declarer was in trouble. Dummy was squeezed! A heart could not be spared, because West would lead the jack to score five heart tricks. Spade ace also could not be discarded, because West would cash two spades and then lead a heart. The diamond queen could not be released, because West could cash the jack to repeat the squeeze on dummy.

So South went down two—300.

Amnesia Seen Reason In Missing Girl's Case

SHORT HILLS, N.J. (AP)—The doctor for Toronto-born Jacqueline Gay Hart indicated Thursday that a recurrence of amnesia may have figured in her baffling disappearance.

The 21-year-old blonde beauty may have been stricken with the same loss of memory she suffered after an auto accident in Virginia two years ago.

Jacqueline was thrown from her car May 12, 1957. She could remember nothing for several hours. She was in a hospital three days.

SUFFER CONCUSSION
Dr. W. Austin Tansey, her doctor here, said she suffered a brain concussion. She made a complete recovery, he said, but he and her family did not rule out the possibility of amnesia.

The girl's father, Ralph, a wealthy business executive, said she had not suffered a loss of memory since the accident.

The girl was last seen Tuesday night kissing her fiance goodbye at Newark Airport. Then she vanished.

The search spread into Canada Thursday. Ralph Hart is reported a native of Basler, Alta., and Jacqueline was born in Toronto where the family lived for a time. Jacqueline's married sister, Mrs. Robert Warriner of Winnipeg, was alerted to report any calls from the girl.

SEARCH AREA
Police scoured the airport and the lonely marshes that surround it again Thursday.

"We are going over all the ground again," said Hart, executive vice-president of the Colgate-Palmolive company. "We are trying everything but there is not a thing in the world now."

But there wasn't. Somewhere between a landing ramp and the well-lit airport parking lot where Jacqueline had left her new car, she disappeared.
