TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 26.

The House met at 3 o'clock. After routine, Mr. Weldon, of St. John, called attention to a bill now before the Imperial Parliament respecting the regulation of the load line of vessels. He thought that as Canadian vessels interests were largely awarded the Dominion, he should have something to say in the matter.

Hon. Charles Tupper said his attention had been called to this bill, and he had sent for a copy, which had not arrived.

The House was summoned to the Senate Chamber, where Sir William Ritchie, Deputy Governor, signed the royal assent to thirty-two bills, which have, this session, passed both Houses.

The House then went into Committee of Supply, taking up the appropriation for the Department of Agriculture.

Considerable discussion took place on the best method to be followed in taking the next census, the general opinion expressed being that the Canadian-born population should be more clearly shown by a special column being provided for that purpose.

After recess the House spent all the evening in supply, considering the Agricultural Department estimates, the immigration policy coming in for a good deal of discussion.

Oxford vs. Cambridge.

LONDON, March 26.

The great Oxford Cambridge boat race took place yesterday on the Thames championship course. The distance was four and a quarter miles. Cambridge, which had won during the past four years, was a favorite in the betting, the odds being six to four and eleven to eight. The water was quite choppy. An unprecedented crowd gathered along both banks of the river, and the interest displayed was without parallel in the annals of the race. Cambridge won the toss and chose the Surrey side of the river. Contrary to all expectations Oxford won. At Hammersmith Bridge, Cambridge was leading by half a length, but the Oxford boys soon overhauled their rivals and crossed the finish line in the lead by one length. Oxford's time was 22 min. 3 sec.

Smuggled Goods Seized.

ST. STEPHEN, March 26.

On Tuesday last Special Customs Officer Bonness seized several barrels of car oil belonging to the Short Line Railway. This oil was shipped from Calais, Me., and was smuggled to St. Stephen. Mr. Bonness also seized several miles of barbed wire fencing, part of which has been erected near St. George. This was also smuggled in the same way. It is stated that there have been some very crooked transactions in connection with the Short Line of late. Some interesting developments are looked for.

Indignation Meeting.

HALIFAX, March 26.

A St. John's, Nfld. despatch reports that a great mass meeting was held there to day at which indignation was expressed against the Anglo-French lobster modus vivendi, and authorized a memorial to be sent to the Queen and British parliament demanding the extinction of the French claims on the Island. A delegation is to be sent to London to present the memorial and urge its importance.

Halifax News.

HALIFAX, March 26.

There is no sign yet of the mail steamer Polynesian, due Sunday. The steamers arriving here during the past month have all reported having experienced very severe weather.

The painters and decorators have notified their employers that they will only work nine hours after the 31st inst.

Turkey Apologizes.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 26.

The difficulty between Turkey and Great Britain, arising from the firing upon a British vessel by the Garrison at Fort Fao, has been satisfactorily arranged. The Porte has apologized to Great Britain for the outrage and will punish those responsible for it.

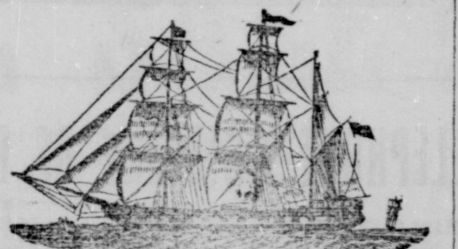
