

Joe Brady's Trial.

The trial of Joe Brady on the charge of murdering Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke began on the 11th instant. The work of calling a jury was begun, and notwithstanding the fact that it was known that all absentees would be summarily fined \$100, many of the jurors on the panel failed to appear.

Mr. Porter in opening the case for the Crown described the crime that had shocked the whole civilized world. He recounted with vivid imagery the well known details of the affair, and in passing, paid a warm tribute to the character and life of Mr. Burke and Lord Cavendish. He then gave particulars of the organization of the "Invincibles," who, he said, doubtless looked upon themselves as an invincible band, but the law is stronger than those connected with the plot.

Mr. Porter for the defence here interposed an earnest protest against the crown counsel being suffered by the court to prejudice the jury against the prisoner by making assertions like these, which could not be proved. The judge however refused to interfere.

The first witness called was Farrell, the informer, who testified at the preliminary examination of the prisoners in Kilmainham court house, repeating the testimony given there. James Carey, who also turned informer at the Kilmainham investigation, was the next witness. His evidence was the same as he had before given.

In cross-examination Carey said:— He was one of the prime movers in the murder of Mr. Burke, but was under compulsion during the time directly preceding the event. Being closely interrogated by counsel on this point he finally admitted he was not under compulsion when he pointed out Burke to the assassins and urged the murderers to remember the man clad in a gray suit was Burke. Witness said although he for sixteen years has been working for wages averaging only two pounds per week, he had in 1882 ninety tenants occupying his various houses. Counsel for the defence brought out in sharp contrast to the points made by the crown that Carey drove with his children to the door of the church in Fitzharris' cab on March 6th; that he was the first man to suggest that daggers be used, and afterwards that the weapons with which the crime was committed be put on exhibition as national relics. Finally, he said he had been informed by Mr. Mallon, chief of the detectives, that if his evidence should be given freely, and should be confirmed by that of other witnesses, he and his brother would be pardoned for their share in the conspiracy.

Carey—That is not true. Subsequently Carey said he was only telling half what he knew, that he was more friendly to the Counsel than he himself was aware of, for he had told the later to bear in mind that he was not telling everything that he knew against his client. Counsel vehemently protested; he wished to have no friendly intercourse with the witness and no favor for him.

The Jury retired, and returned a verdict of guilty on the morning of the 14th, and Brady was sentenced to be hanged on the 14th of May.
