**THE BRITISH ADVANCE.**

HAVING gallantly held their own, all along the line, in the face of forces many times superior in point of numbers, and defeated the "dead shot Boers" in every considerable engagement that has taken place, the British are now beginning their offensive operations. The advance of the column under Lord Methuen has been successful. The enemy has been driven out of a strong position. This is the first of a series of advances which, it is hoped and believed, will lead on to Kimberly and Mafeking, to Bloemfontein, Johannesburg and Pretoria. That there are many and serious difficulties before them is, of course, true. But we may hope that the valorous British troops, fighting under the old flag, will speedily overcome them all.

**QUEER!**

A good deal of political capital was some time ago, made in Summerside, Bedeque, and elsewhere on account of the building of a second winter steamer. It was of the "queer" kind. The Stanley is to be laid up at Georgetown. We are to have but one winter steamer in operation. The Dominion Government has followed the example of the Provincial Government which built The Hillsborough (Bodder) and then laid The Southport up at the wharf! Our Charlottetown Board of Trade expected great things in the way of increased trade, as a result of its deputation to Ottawa two years ago. It has obtained a badly constructed and ill-finished new winter steamer; and the good old steamer Stanley is laid up to do nothing.

A Washington despatch reports that the secretary of the treasury has advised the collector of customs at Buffalo that Canadian cattle and sheep may be shipped through the United States for exportation from Philadelphia, Baltimore and Newport News, Va., as well as from Portland, Me., Boston and New York. Until now the ports of exportation of Canadian cattle and sheep have been limited to these three ports.

**A CASE OF DAMON AND PYTHIAS.**

THE Hon. Donald Farquharson made a rather important statement at the Pownal meeting. He said that Mr. David P. Irving was very unwilling to become a candidate, and would not have consented to run except on his (Mr. Farquharson's) account. It is said that some men are born great, others achieve greatness while some have greatness thrust upon them. It seems that Mr. David P. Irving is to stand in the latter category. His greatness, if it ever comes, is to be thrust upon him, not by the people of Belfast, but by Mr. Donald Farquharson. If Mr. Irving was so indifferent to the interests of the Belfast District that he would not consent to serve it on its own account, and only came forward on account of Mr. Farquharson, it might be just as well to let Mr. Farquharson elect him, if he can; for it is very plain that he will be, if elected, the faithful follower of Mr. Farquharson, and not the independent representative of Belfast.

It is true that the feeling of esteem is only felt by one man, but with that man it is stronger than his regard for the eighteen hundred electors of Belfast. The intensity of the admiration of Mr. Irving cannot be doubted. It would now be in order for some declaration to be forthcoming, showing that the friendship is mutual. It would then become a case of Damon and Pythias. So far as Mr. Irving is concerned the parallel is already complete. He is going to political death for his friend.

It would be interesting to be informed on what grounds this enthusiastic attachment of Mr. Irving for Mr. Farquharson rests. Was it that clever comersault on the Liquor License question that bound Mr. Farquharson to Mr. Irving's "soul with hooks of steel"? It is just now a question whether the mesmeric influence of the Premier may not cause Mr. Irving to look with as much complacency "ca blood money," as that quondam temperance advocate, the Hon. Donald Farquharson.
