Magnificent Blaze at Hull.

OTTAWA, Nov. 3. They had a magnificent blaze at Hull, opposite the city, last night. Eddy's lumber yard, saw mills, match factory, and mill factory, were totally consumed by fire.

Dufferin Starts for Cairo.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 3. Lord Dufferin, British Ambassador, started for Cairo yesterday, to conduct negotiations for the settlement of the Egyptian question.

El Medhi Defeated.

LONDON, Nov. 3. In the House of Commons last night, Sir Charles Dilke, Under Foreign Secretary, stated that news had been received from Cairo that the Soudan False Prophet El Medhi had been defeated by the governor of Khartoum.

Joint Control to be Abolished.

PARIS, Nov. 3. A majority of the French Cabinet have accepted the fresh proposal of Lord Granville, Foreign Secretary, to abolish the Joint Control of Egypt, and allow the Khedive to appoint a High Commission.

Cloture.

LONDON, Nov. 3. In the House of Commons, last night, Mr. Gibson's Amendment to the Cloture resolutions was fully discussed by Liberals and Conservatives. The Amendment was to effect that a debate should be closed unless by a vote of two-thirds majority.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 1. At a meeting of the committee of the House of Commons, to investigate the imprisonment of E. Dwyer Gray, it was decided that the proceedings will be private.

TRIPOLI, Nov. 1. The Grand Vizier, to-day requested Lord Dufferin to postpone his departure. Lord Dufferin replied that it was impossible to comply with the request.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Nov. 1. In a collision between a mob and a party of soldiers, who were guarding Neal and Crafts, the Castlebury murderers, to-day five persons were killed.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1. The debt statement, issued to-day, shows the reduction of public debt during October to be \$15,629,180.55.

MANILA, Nov. 1. One hundred sailors were drowned during the recent typhoon.

CAIRO, Nov. 1. It has been decided to equip with the utmost speed a small force, which will be despatched in the hope of saving Khartoum and checking the advance of the False Prophet, until the re-organization of the army allows an offensive movement to be undertaken.

LONDON, Nov. 1. The Times' Cairo correspondent telegraphs that DeLesseps' evidence before the prosecution committee was generally considered unfavorable to Arabi, as proving conclusively that whenever Arabi exerted himself to prevent the commission of outrage he was able to do so.

The Daily News says that after Gladstone's speech on the Cloture question, in the House of Commons last evening, the Opposition had difficulty in keeping it up. The Daily News' Lyons correspondent says: There is great distress among the operatives here, as the law makes no provision for them, and want tends to make the destitute desperate.

Several carboys of nitric acid, a number of empty shells, dynamite fuses and other explosive materials have been found near the garden of the prisoner Bietz house. Bietz formerly had a clandestine dynamite factory in Geneva. His niece and two gardeners, supposed to be accomplices, have been arrested.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1. An arrangement has been made by which Mrs. Langtry will appear on Monday next in Wallack's Theatre, in the play of "An Unequal Match."

The Herald's Washington correspondent says: The Western Press Association, it is reported here, has severed its connexion with the New York Associated Press, and will, Nov. 1st, begin independent service here under the management of Walter P. Philis. Independent service is to be established at once in all parts of the country, and a force equal to that employed by the New York Associated Press will be engaged to compete with this organization.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 1. Considerable revival of Nihilist activity observable. The Nihilist organ declares revolution to be imminent. Increased precautions are taken to insure the safety of

the Czar, and his future movements are kept secret.

MADRID, Nov. 1. The information which the government has here respecting the manner which the Cubans who attempted to escape from Cadix fell into the hands of the Spanish authorities, does not accord with the statements made by Evelyn Ashley, in the British House of Commons, yesterday.

BERLIN, Nov. 1. The German-Russian-Swiss socialists purchased the old castle Wyden, at Winterthur, for a socialist printing establishment.

LONDON, Nov. 1. The books of the chief revolutionary organ here, L'Espresso Revolucionaire, having been seized under a judicial warrant, that journal temporarily ceased to appear.

PARIS, Nov. 1. The upholsterers are on a strike here and are boycotting houses of Jules Duval and Baron Adolphe Rothschild.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 1. The elections for Norwegian Shorting resulted in a crushing defeat of the Government by four-fifths returned being Radicals or Republicans.
