'Scottish Day' Yesterday Is Carnival's Most Successful

SUMMERSIDE — Although rain forced cancellation of last night's third Lobster Carnival week race card and curtailed some of the other activities, the feeling was unanimous that yesterday, having been designated as "Scottish Day", was by far the most successful day of the week.

The chairman of the Scottish Day activities, John Hopkirk, put a lot of work into arranging two musical programs, afternoon and evening, and the unexpectedly large crowds who turned out for both programs, were in no way disappointed, especially by the afternoon program at the raceway.

The program at the raceway, for which Rev. J.S. McBride, Presbyterian minister here, was master of ceremonies, consisted of massed band performances, pipe band competition, singing and other attractions.

The Scottish program began with a parade along Water Street late yesterday morning consisting of all pipe bands led by the Black Watch Band from Camp Gagetown, N.B. as well as one of the winning floats in Monday's parade, Miss P.E.I., 1965, and Catherine MacKinnon.

The large turnout for the morning parade which travelled along Water Street to Summer St and disbanded at the firehall, was an indication of things to come. The crowd snowballed into one of the largest seen in recent years at the local raceway.

The afternoon program lasted for more than 2½ hours and during the entire program all the performances were viewed with immense interest with the only people other than the performers, seen moving, being ones trying to find a better position for watching the program.

The program opened with all the participating bands, led by the Black Watch, marching individually onto the track in front of the grandstands. Following this the visiting Army band put on a pipe and marching performance. They then retired to the side of the track to allow for the pipe band competition between the Stellarton Balmoral Girls,

St. John Kiwanis Junior and Summerside Presbyterian Highland Society pipe bands.

The judge for the competition, Pipe Major MacInnis of the Black Watch, selected the Stellarton Balmorals as the best in the competition, followed by the St. John Kiwanis and Summerside band respectively.

After the winner had been announced, Mayor George Key presented a beautiful silver trophy to the pipe major of the Balmorals, Madeline Russell.

Catherine MacKinnon was then piped onto the track where she performed from a stage located a short distance away from the tote-board in front of the stands. She was accompanied by guitarist Brian A'Heerne.

Afterwards highland dancers from the local pipe band danced in a group and the bands then regrouped on the track and played en masse.

The program closed with the Tattoo, an impressive ceremony performed by the Black Watch.

The Stadium was packed for last night's program which featured hand and dancing performances by the Presbyterian Pipe Band along with the songs of Catherine MacKinnon.

With Scottish Day, held for the first time this year, being such a success, officials expressed hope that similar events will be held during Lobster Carnival Week in future years.

Crops made rapid growth in Saskatchewan last week. The average wheat height of 17 inches compares to 15 a year ago. Coarse grains averaged 13, compared to 13. However, overall crop development in the province is still behind schedule.

FAIR TO GOOD
Crop prospects continued good in southern and west-central Alberta, but conditions ranged from fair to poor in the east-central region, with Ripley, Viking and Vegreville areas especially critical.

Recent rains helped restore prospects in the Peace River district of Northern Alberta, but only a fair harvest is expected there.

The Alberta sugar beet crop is progressing favorably. Wheat acreages were well up from last year in each of the three provinces, although only Saskatchewan set a record.

The Saskatchewan acreage hit 19,700,000, six per cent above the 1965 total of 18,500,000, and well beyond the previous high of 19,200,000 established in 1964.

Manitoba wheat acreage totalled 3,480,000, up seven per cent from 3,240,000 last year. The Alberta total of 6,600,000 is nine per cent above last year's 6,050,000.

In all three cases, the 1966 figures are well beyond the 1954-63 averages.

Acreages by province for other major crops with 1965 figures in brackets:

Manitoba—oats 1,620,000 (1,630,000), barley 830,000 (801,000) rye 136,000 (151,000), flaxseed 1,220,000 (1,350,000).

Saskatchewan—oats 2,130,000 (2,330,000), barley 2,200,977 (1,750,000), rye 268,000 (340,000), flaxseed 475,000 (560,000), rapeseed 620,000 (555,000).

Alberta—oats 2,450,000 (2,650,000), barley 3,840,000 (3,390,000), rye 159,000 (200,000), flaxseed 334,000 (355,000) rapeseed 61,000 (735,000).

Gold Chalice Given To St. Margaret's

Stephen L. Kelly, New York City, recently donated a valuable gold chalice to the St. Margaret's Parish in Prince Edward Island, in memory of his sister, the late Mrs. Gertrude (Kelly) Parry, whose death occurred at the beginning of this year. Mrs. Parry, a former Island school teacher, lived in New York for more than forty years.

The memorial chalice was made by Parisian goldsmith Francois Dupont. It is of sterling silver and is goldplated, has a paneled base and agate knob, and is modern gothic in design. It was consecrated by Most Reverend Malcolm A. MacEachern, Bishop of Charlottetown, and was used for the first time by Reverend Daniel O'Hanley in the offering of his first Solemn Mass in St. Margaret's Church.
