

Curranites Leading Abbies 5-0 When Jr. Game Halted

The Abbie Jr.-Curran & Briggs baseball game at Queen Elizabeth Park yesterday afternoon came to an abrupt end with two out in the bottom of the fifth inning, and the C. & B. boys leading 5-0. Dee Lefurgy had attempted to stretch a triple into a home run, but the Charlottetown catcher was waiting for him with the ball as he came into the plate.

The runner was caught cold, but the visiting backstop tagged him with what looked like unnecessary vigor, allegedly on the side of the face. The tagged runner grabbed the catcher, and others rushed into the melee with the result that both coaches, Johnny Carroll and Randy Edwards, took their teams off the field.

McDonald, on the mound for the Abbies, and Garland Harris, midge flinger hurling for the Curranites, both had pitched well up to the break-up of the game. Harris had allowed only four hits in five innings, and D. MacDonald gave up only six bingles in 4 2/3 frames.

The throwing of Kenny MacDonald was a feature of the abbreviated contest, his accurate pegs from right field having cut down Grant Grady at second in the first inning, Harris at the plate in the third inning, and finally Lefurgy at the plate in what turned out to be the last play of the game.

Lefurgy's triple was the only extra-base blow of the five frames played.

The fight fans were packed around the ring at the Charlottetown Forum in large numbers yesterday evening to watch Cobey McCluskey and Gary Simon in their pre-fight workouts. A slim and trim McCluskey climbed between the ropes about 6:45, followed by Duck Trainor and Roy Diamond. Less than a half hour later Gary "The German" Simon and Jackie Hayden of New Glasgow went through their paces with Simon taking matters easily and Hayden working much harder.

McCluskey looked good. As they say in the fight game, he was lean and keen. His brother Wilf told us that Cobey was down to 151 pounds. After the workout Cobey claimed he would weigh about 153 by noon tomorrow or possibly 154 after he ate dinner. "Any predictions about the outcome?" we asked him. "I think I'll win by a decision. I never seen Simon fight but they tell me he crowds you all the time. That's the kind of a fight I like," replied Cobey.

"You look as though you have trained hard for this one," stated boxing promoter Ivan Doherty in the form of a question. "Yeah, I've been running every morning and have done a lot of glove work during the past month." "Were you working out with 'Kid' Howard?" we asked. "I've trained with Dick for the last three weeks," he answered. "How about that fight with Cecil Gray last week?" we continued. "Well, I took it as a tune-up for this one. Gray weighted about 200 but I won by an unanimous decision." "What about your fight with Doug Harper in Calgary?" queried Amby Weatherbie. "How much did you weigh?" "I was down to about 151. Harper weighed 175. He's a big man. Stands six foot, two. He was too tall for me," responded Cobey.

"Harper is fighting Durelle up in Newcastle, New Brunswick tonight. Harper is a good fighter and he might be good enough to knockout Durelle."

Meanwhile, Simon and Jackie Hayden were working out inside the squared circle. "I hear Hayden is fighting in place of Bob Ledley," stated a bystander. "No, Hayden just came over from New Glasgow to see the fight tomorrow night," replied Ivan Doherty. "The German looks to be taking things pretty easy," said Noel Wilson.

The group was joined a few minutes later by Harry Trainor, Simon's manager. After an introduction we inquired about Simon's chances to take McCluskey. "I'm not saying a thing but I know that if McCluskey will go in there and fight, it's going to be a terrific battle. Simon doesn't look very good in there now but don't let him fool you. He's hot opening up very

Durelle Regains Boxing Crown

NEWCASTLE, N.B. (CP)—Yvon Durelle of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., regained the Canadian lightweight boxing championship Wednesday night with a 12-round decision over Doug Harper of Calgary.

It was the third bout between the pair. Durelle lost the title to Harper in Calgary and later fought a draw in the same city.

Before their third meeting, the 23-year-old Harper fought 43 times since starting his career in 1948 and lost only two decisions, both to heavyweights. He is ranked second among British Commonwealth lightweights.

Durelle, 24, has had more than 100 professional bouts. One of his five losses was to an outstanding Brooklyn battler, Floyd Patterson. He made his ring debut seven years ago.

The durable Durelle recaptured the crown by unanimous decision. Judge Jack Johnston of Saint John gave him 10 rounds with one to Harper and the other even. Judge E. T. Weeks of Logville called it eight, three and one. Referee Wilfred Manuel of Chatham favored the challenger in seven, gave two to Harper and called three even.

Durelle weighted in at 166 against 170. Aggressiveness and heavier punching gave him the nod.

Other players fighting. Several other players intervened and it was minutes before order was restored. The teams were ready to resume play when another Summerside player tackled the Abbies catcher. After this incident the two coaches withdrew their players from the field and called off the game.

McCluskey-Simon Ready For Big Fight Tonight

The two leading middleweight boxers in the Maritime Provinces, Cobey McCluskey of Charlottetown and Gary "The German" Simon from New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, fight tonight at the Forum for the right to meet Charlie Chase in a bout for the Dominion Middleweight championship.

Both fighters checked into Charlottetown yesterday in top shape for the most important fight of their career. McCluskey will go into the ring at 153 pounds and Simon at 156.
