The Customs receipts at the port of Montreal of this year for the quarter ending 30 June were \$1,560,595; a decrease of \$125,565, as compared with the same quarter in 1882. The receipts for the year show an increase of \$81,594 over the previous twelve months.

WILLIAM CARROLL, of North River, and Edward Flinnigan, sailor, were arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate this afternoon, charged with stealing a horse and wagon from Admiral Bayfield, Patrick McCardle, of Lot 30, was also arraigned as an accomplice. After hearing evidence, the three prisoners were remanded for eight days.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Horrible Disaster—Over Fifty Persons Drowned.

GLASGOW, July 4. The large steamer "Daphne," just launched from the Clyde shipyard capsized after leaving the launchways. Two hundred people were known to have been on board. Fifty men who were in the hold were drowned, besides some of those on deck. The steamer lies across the river, thus stopping navigation.

Cork Industrial Exhibition

QUEENSTOWN, July 4. The Cork Industrial Exhibition was opened successfully to-day. The attendance was enormous, and the exhibition is pronounced to be one of the best ever held here.

Cholera in the East.

PORT SAID, July 4. The infected portions of the town of Damietta were burned yesterday, and the inhabitants have been ordered under canvas.

The Tonquin Expedition.

PARIS, July 4. The first French transport has arrived at Tonquin.

South American Troubles.

NEW YORK, July 4. The latest accounts from South America are to the effect that the Chilians are now evacuating Peru.

Telegraph Notes.

Rev. Thomas Walsh, vicar general of the diocese of Hartford, died on the 2nd, aged 54.

By a collision on the 1st between a train on the Pittsburg & Fort Wayne road and a street car at a crossing in Chicago three persons were killed and several wounded.

Right Rev. Jno. S. Train, D. D., catholic archbishop of St. Andrews and Edinburgh, is dead. He was born December 8, 1810, and was transferred to archiepiscopal see of St. Andrews and Edinburgh in March, 1878.

In the British House of Lords, on the 2nd, Lord Derby, Colonial Secretary, said the government was not prepared to annex New Guinea. Mr. Gladstone made a similar statement in the House of Commons.

At Monaghan, on the 2nd, Healy addressed a large crowd of people, by whom he was received with great enthusiasm. He said that landlordism had been trampled under foot, and that the election represented the demand of Ulster for speedy reform in the land laws. He said there was little doubt that before many years every farmer in Ireland would be owner of his holding.

The Steamer "Queen," of the National Line, arrived at New York on the 2nd with 731 passengers. The emigration inspectors learned that 175 of them were pauper immigrants and the emigration authorities notified the steamship company that they declined to receive them until a guarantee was given that they would be taken back to Europe when all necessary legal formalities were complied with.

An accident occurred on the Rochester & Pittsburgh Railroad at 3 o'clock on the 1st at Russell, 25 miles south east of Bradford. The first section of a coal train to which was attached a passenger car containing fifteen persons, broke in two on a heavy grade and seven of the cars rushing back down the grade ran into the second section smashing the cars to pieces. Six persons, including a conductor and a brakeman were killed and the others wounded more or less severely.

Mr. Biggar, M. P., in a speech at Manchester on the 2nd, declared that the leading trait of the present Government was falsehood. He said that Mr. Errington had been sent to Rome to lie in alleging that Parnell and his friends were in league with murderers, and that the Irish were without grievances. He thought it doubtful whether Mr. Trevelyan, present chief secretary for Ireland, was much better than Forster. He asserted that Trevelyan had recently lied about paupers shipped across the Atlantic.

The Italian navies at work on the new branch of the Midland Railway, between Omomee and Peterboro, Ontario, have for several weeks past been warning all hands that they intended to strike on Monday, 2nd for \$1.50 per day, and that they would prevent work being done on the road unless they got the raise in their wages. On the 2nd they refused to work and tried to drive off all others that were working. Revolvers were used on both sides. Four Italians were wounded, but not dangerously. One of them was arrested and brought before a magistrate. He had a wound in the fleshy part of the forearm.

A fire broke out at Dauphin County Almshouse, two miles from Harrisburgh, Pa., on the 2nd inst., and destroyed every building on the ground, except the laundry and the schoolhouse. The fire was discovered in a stable located near the main structure, an elegant building three stories high. The stable was consumed with its contents, including five horses and two mules. The heated slate on the structure set fire to that building, and there was a high wind at the time, the building was soon destroyed. As soon as the dwelling caught, the steward and his assistants rushed to the insane department and forced the excited inmates, 21 females and 17 males, from their quarters. All were saved, though some fought desperately.
