George Bayer Wins Can. Open

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP)—George Bayer, 31-year-old blonde giant from Los Angeles, is no longer the proverbial bridesmaid on golf's tournament trail.

The massive 240-pounder who has finished in the runner-up spot the last two years in the big-money league, won the 72-hole Canadian Open title Saturday with a blistering 13-under-par score of 271 over the rolling Westmont course. It was his first pro victory since he gave up a pro football career with Washington Redskins for a living on the golf courses in 1935.

He ended the final 18 holes with a two-under-par 69 to finish two strokes ahead of the fast-closing Bo Winger of Odessa, Tex., who plastered the layout with a six-under-par 63, best of the final round. The silver-thatched Winger pocketed second money of \$2,300.

Bayer wound up with the \$3,500 first-place money, a replica of the Seagram Gold Cup and an apology to the huge crowd surrounding the 18th-hole green for remarks he made after the first round on Wednesday.

"Remarks were made that this course was bad and I was quoted as making such statements," he said. "But I'll apologize for that because I didn't realize how much work had to be done. I said the course needed a lawn mower and they found one."

EQUALLED MARK
Bayer's rounds were 70-68-64-69. His third round, scored on Friday, equalled the record set only a couple of hours earlier by Bob Toski of Miami, who ended the tournament with a one-over-par 281 and \$40 prize money.

In third place was 46-year-old Henry Ransom of St. Andrews, N.S. He shot rounds of 68-68-72-68—276, good for \$1,800. Doug Ford of Mahopac, N. Y., who won \$36,100 before coming here this year, started the final round four

strokes behind Bayer, but slipped to a par 71 Saturday for a 277-total and \$1,500 of the \$35,000 prize money.

Freddie Hawkins of El Paso, Texas, a veteran campaigner on the circuit, Pat Schwab of Dayton, Ohio, Bill Casper, Jr., of Bonita, Calif., and Frank Stranahan of Toledo, Ohio, tied for fourth with 278, worth \$1,130 each.

HENRICK TOP CANADIAN

The leading Canadian was Ottawa's Johnny Henrick who scored 72-67-70-72—281 for \$1,050, which included \$300 as top Canadian. Stan Leonard of Larchute, Que., brought his 1957 earnings to more than \$11,000 with a 282 total and \$590 prize money. Kitchen's Moe Norman, appearing in his first big pro tournament, equalled Leonard's score.

Leading amateur was Jerry Magee of Toronto who shot even par 284.

After finishing his final round, Bayer said "this is just about the greatest thing that ever happened to me." He also thanked others in the field for "playing so bad."

Bayer wasn't kidding. He started in the same threesome with Ford who was just four strokes back. In the threesome ahead was Casper who started the round in second place, three strokes behind.

Casper shot a two-over-par 73. He blew his chances on the par-four eighth when he took a six, needing two strokes to get out of a trap. He three-putted the par-four ninth to take a five and finish the nine in 37.

Bayer finished the front nine in even-par 35.

Casper complained about the gallery talking and wandering and also about crowding by the Bayer threesome behind him. On the 11th, Bayer's second shot landed among the gallery in front of the green as Casper was about to putt. He stalked to Bayer's ball and smashed his putter into the turf next to it.

hole he chipped up and putted out for a par four, walked to the edge of the green and said to a grey-haired spectator: "Did you have something to say to me? If you were younger I'd make something out of it."

About 8,000 spectators swarmed over the course Saturday bringing the four-day attendance total to 18,000.

Commence To Dig In Palestine

AMMAN, Jordan (Reuters)—One of the largest archaeological expeditions ever to come here began excavating in the Tell Balata Nabulus area where the ruins of Schechem—one of the great cities of ancient Palestine—are located.

Previous expeditions to Schechem, in 1913-14 and 1926-32, uncovered an enormous city hall, ruins of two city gates, and the largest temple ever found in Jordan, sponsored by Drew University and the McCormick Theological Seminary in the United States, with the co-operation of the American School of Oriental Research in Jerusalem.

Schechem, the ancient name for Nabulus, is located on the main road between Jerusalem and the

Diefenbaker Closed Stampede

CALGARY (CP)—John Diefenbaker came West to see the Calgary Stampede Saturday his first public function in Canada since becoming prime minister three weeks ago.

He obviously enjoyed every minute of it, watching cowboys trying their hardest to stay aboard pitching broncos, touring an Indian village on the stampede grounds, cheering with a crowd of more than 20,000 at the hard-driving chuckwagon races.

Mr. Diefenbaker flew to Calgary from Ottawa, accompanied by Mrs. Diefenbaker, to start a 10-day holiday, his first since before the election. Sunday he flew to Saskatoon to see his mother. He was to fly to his home constituency of Prince Albert before going on a fishing trip to Lac la Ronge in Northern Saskatchewan.

He is due back in Ottawa July 23.

His visit to the stampede was officially to close the week-long Western show. It was the first time a prime minister closed the stampede.

At the stampede's Indian village, Mr. Diefenbaker was presented with a scroll marking his visit. It was presented to him by Chief Albert Lightning, 37-year-old president of the Indian Association of Alberta.
