PARKERSBURG, W. Va., Oct 13.—George Dilly, of Lincoln county, a circus man, has been killed by a female elephant at Ronceverte. Dilly had been teasing the elephant and her baby, and though warned to stop kept on until the animal became enraged. During the night, while Dilly and two other men were asleep in the tent, the elephant broke her chain, walked over two of the men, picked up Dilly with her trunk, and beat him to death on the ground, and then crushed him with her feet.

MARCHAND WAS IN SORE STRAITS.

Evidence Proves His Condition was Desperate.

A FRENCH OUTLET BY THE NILE.

Believed That Marchand May be Authorized to Return by Way of Cairo.

PARIS, Oct 13.—The London correspondent of Matin, who generally echoes the opinions of the French Embassy at the British capital, admits that the evidence supports the truth of the reports as to the desperate condition in which General Kitchener found Major Marchand, and as to the latter's lack of supplies of any kind. He says:

"It is probable that Major Marchand confessed his inability to retain the position, even if not handicapped by the presence of the British and the dervishes. It is, however, out of the question that Marchand should accept the British offer, courteous though it be, to provide him transportation to Cairo. If he admits the impracticability of remaining at Fashoda, he ought to fall back to his former post at Bahr-el-Ghazal. In such an event France could negotiate with Great Britain to enable her to revictual and reinforce Major Marchand by the only possible route, namely, the Nile. Whatever may be the developments of the situation, however, France must not abandon her rights to have an outlet by the Nile for the commerce of her central African possession."

The Government, it is reported, has been informed that its despatch to Major Marchand, forwarded by the courtesy of the British Government through the Sirdar, has already been delivered, and that Major Marchand is sending an officer with his reply to Cairo, whence it will be telegraphed to Paris, probably arriving early next week.

The extremist papers are making strong efforts to excite public opinion against Great Britain, but it is believed in the best-informed circles that Major Marchand will be authorized to return by way of Cairo.

Spain and the States.

MADRID, October 13.—The Spanish Government announces its intention to maintain a strong force of troops in Cuba until the treaty of peace with the United States is definitely signed. Immediately after peace is signed, the Cortes will be organized and measures dealing with the re-organization of all the state departments will be submitted to Parliament.

WASHINGTON, D. C., October 13.—The American commissioners have notified the Spanish authorities in Havana that the United States will assume entire control, military and governmental, of the island of Cuba on December 1. The same control will be exercised in Porto Rico on October 13.

WHEAT RUINED BY RAIN.

Quarter of the Manitoba Crop said to be Spoilt.

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct 13.—It is estimated that one-fourth of the wheat crop in Manitoba has been ruined by the prolonged wet weather. Some men say that this estimate is very small. Threshing is at a standstill, and dealers are taking second buyers of the market, owing to paucity of deliveries. The weather is not clear and suitable for the present condition of outstanding grain, and if it continues for a fortnight the balance of the crops should be saved.

Prices have changed considerably during the last few days. Seventy one cents and over is now bid at Fort William. Dealers who have got wheat are inclined to hold.

HOME FROM KLONDIKE.

An Old Miner Satisfied With the Results of His Trip.

CORNWALL, Oct 13.—F. S. Campbell, of Dominionville, who recently returned from Dawson City, says that he found that region just as he expected. His knowledge of an experience in mining has placed him in a position to use his judgment to better advantage than most of those who visited that golden land and he was in no way disappointed. He had seen as rich mines there as he had ever seen in Cariboo, Cassiar, Colorado or Arizona. He has seen ground worth \$25 000 a running foot, but it was not all like that. In the Klondike there were blanks as well as best where, but on the whole it was the best mining camp he had ever known for placer digging. In order to fully participate in the wealth a man should stay there and wait until the country was developed. He and his partner, ex-Reeve McDougall, of Maxville, had experienced little difficulty in making the trips either going or coming. In fact, they were pleasure trips. They left Dawson on August 11th on a river steamer called the Cudahy, reaching St. Michael's, a distance of 1,900 miles, in six days, the fastest time ever made on the Yukon. The Cudahy is a new boat, this being her first trip. After laying off four days at St. Michael's they took the ocean steamer Roanoke for Seattle, arriving in eight days and four hours, covering a distance of 2,500 miles. On the way coming down from Dawson to St. Michael's they counted forty river steamers laden with provisions for the Yukon district.
