CAMPAIGN NOTES.

The North St. John Herald's very effective simile—"Grit politicians are very much like hens sitting on chicken eggs. They are everlastingly cackling about trying to hatch out blue ruin, and if it does not come it is not their fault."

The Week: "In spite of all the obj ec tions which may be urged against Sir Charles Tupper, he is undoubtedly a strong man—the strongest man the Conservative party could have chosen—in fact almost the only man they could have served under. He has courage, tenacity, and a sequence and great powers of carrying a policy to its practical and logical conclusion."

In his letter to Mr. Laurier, Sir Oliver Mowat, among other things, says: "It is the general opinion of the party, to whose favor and confidence are owing my twenty three years of the Premiership of Ontario, that the crisis is so grave that every personal sacrifice has to be made, and every incidental risk run."

The Winnipeg Tribune has probably the right end of the Mowat story. It says that Mowat will not take any risks, but that he will "actively in the fight."

Halifax Herald: Sir Oliver Mowat's chances of grit victory is clear from the amount of risk he is willing to take in the campaign. He takes no risk at all! He says to Laurier, if you win, you may make me senator and a minister, if you still want me. Lots of "ifs" in Sir Oliver's letter. But Sir Oliver had any faith in the grit prospects of success, and was really willing to join Mr. Laurier's party, he would resign his present seat and run for the House of Commons. Having no such faith, he rears nothing and risks nothing. Sir Oliver's letter when calmly read must be very disheartening to the grit.

Montreal Gazette: "Thank God, there are no Orangemen among us, the Ministers is the way the Toronto Globe turns Mr. Laurier's Chaucerian utterance, which says: "Thank God, there are no Orangemen among us, the Ministers." The object of the Globe is to convince the Orangemen that they have been established in the formation of the Conservative Government. The Liberal election of Laurier, however, did it to convince the Catholics that no Orangemen would be allowed in the Liberal ranks. This sort of thing is counted statesmanship by the men who rattle around in the Liberal ranks. George Brown and Alexander Mackenzie filled.

Montreal Gazette: Mr. Taillon, the Conservative Premier of Quebec, was invited by Sir Charles Tupper to give up his position, and take the risks of a general election in the Liberal ranks. He did it at once. Sir Oliver Mowat, the Liberal Premier of Ontario, was the recipient of a like invitation from Mr. Laurier. He took a couple of weeks to consider the matter, and then he decided that he would wait and see how his prospective chief came out of the election contest, before he would throw up his present position. In this contest Mr. Taillon gets the prize of course. He also gets the credit of having most faith in his party.

Hon. Edward Farrer, "gri ambassador" to Washington, seems by his able presentation of the grit case to have succeeded in making the U. S. press solid in support of his party. The Washington Post comes to us with the following additional testimony respecting the great interest which our U. S. cousins are taking in the present contest:—"The parliamentary election in the Dominion is beginning to excite an exceptional interest on our side of the line, and the sympathy and good wishes of our people are decidedly on the side of the liberals."

Exactly. And we in Canada know why. That is largely the reason why the "good wishes" of the Canadian people are so "decidedly" the other way. A Montreal despatch says the con t of appeals will decide if the Salvation Army have a legal right to parade the streets and sing hymns.

The New York Herald's correspondent at Guaymas, Ecuador, telegraphs that the province of Manabá suffered terribly on Wednesday from an earthquake which Puerto Viejo. Houses were thrown down, many persons were burned alive in the ruins, and many others injured.
