OTTAWA, Aug. 18.—It is stated that though it has been decided that gentlemen shall be called from the commons to fill vacancies existing in the senate no nominations will be recommended to his excellency unless it is probable the conservatives will consent to the liberal candidates in consequent bye-elections for the commons being returned by acclamation. If there are any probabilities of contested bye-elections the senate vacancies will be continued until immediately before the general elections.

## QUEEN SQUARE GARDENS.

Sir,—While attending the band concert on the square last evening, I could not help wondering what strangers must think of the way affairs are managed in Charlottetown. Instead of the square being brilliantly lighted with electric lights and plenty of seats being scattered about all was darkness except around the band stand and only a very few people could obtain seats. Now, I do not think we need hope for or expect much from our stick-in-the-mud city council. But surely there are some of our moneyed men philanthropic enough to take this matter in hand and have the square and gardens well lighted and made more agreeable for strangers and our own citizens. All, I am sure would greatly appreciate such a change for the better. And here I would just remark that our public gardens are degenerating every year. Nothing but the commonest flowers are used and very little taste is shown in their arrangement. Now when Mr. Newbury looked after things some years ago the gardens were a thing of beauty, and good taste was shown. I think that for the fair amount of money spent there is a very poor show, indeed, and I would suggest that those having the supervision of the gardens should see to it that a better return is given for the money. My reason for writing this is that I am myself a native of Charlottetown. I do not like to see our pretty little city behind the times, especially when so many travellers are coming here who are used to better things.

## German Competition.

BREMEN, Aug. 18.—The Imperial Government has subsidized the German East African Steamship Company in the amount of 1,200,000 marks (\$255,600) annually, on condition that the company extend its semi-monthly trips to Delagoa Bay, Durban, and Cape Town. This will bring German shippers into direct competition with the British throughout the whole of South Africa, and is expected greatly to help the export trade of this country.

## Roman Relics.

STRASBURG, Aug. 18.—In excavating for a sewer in Strasburg, workmen yesterday uncovered a large quantity of Roman remains, some of them of great value. At a depth of 15 feet was discovered an old Roman mint, some of the precious metal remaining as it had cooled in the melting pots when the mint was abandoned.

## Jay Gould Killed.

BUFFALO, N. Y., August 18.—While George Frank, Jay Gould and two young ladies were crossing the Lake Shore tracks in Erie last night, their carriage was struck by an engine. Gould and one of the ladies were so badly injured that they died. The other woman is in a precarious condition. Frank was not seriously injured, but his horses were killed.

## Arctic Exploration.

St. John's, Nfld., August 13.—The Labrador mail steamer reports that the Peary expedition steamer Diana passed Domino Run, Northern Labrador, at 2 p. m. July 24th. All on board were well at that time. The Diana hoped to reach Disco, Greenland, July 29.
