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Pugwash Oil Find Sparks Interest

DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP) — Oil discoveries in a salt mine at Pugwash, N.S., would have considerable importance if found in sufficiently large quantities, manager Hugh Grassy of the Imperial Oil Ltd. refinery here said Wednesday.

Mr. Grassy said tests at the refinery indicated the oil lies in the general range of crude petroleum.

A small quantity of oil was found Monday at the Canadian Rock Salt Co.'s mine in Pugwash.

Summerside Board Finds Tourist Bureau Cost High

Members of the local board of trade were told at a meeting here last night that the new tourist bureau at Wilnot Valley, which is expected to be completed and open for business by mid-June, will cost in the vicinity of \$10,000 instead of the original estimate of \$6,500.

This came to light when the tenders were opened with the lowest bid being entered by Althe Harris of Summerside. His bid was \$9,950 with the next lowest being in the vicinity of \$13,000. Mr. Harris was awarded the contract and the project was started but the hospitalization of Mr. Harris has brought work to a standstill.

The Board of Trade has been assured, however, that the hos-

pitalization will not stop the project from being completed on the anticipated date.

As a result of the bids entered, the tourist bureau committee was given authorization to borrow up to \$6,500 from the bank for the project.

SERVE FOR YEARS

Charles Linkletter, a member of the bureau committee, was quite confident that the building will add to the community. "It's a unique design and the bureau will serve the community for years to come," he said.

The meeting was also told that the bureau will be connected to other bureaus on the island by two-way radio and also that island telephone is prepared to put in a drive-in telephone. This would be the first of its kind on the island.

Both Creelman MacArthur, a member of downtown parking committee and Mayor George Key, Jr. spoke briefly on this project and told the meeting that work on the project was coming along well.

The chairman of the retail merchants committee, Howard Waite, stated that at the last meeting of his group it had been suggested that Santa Claus lane be replaced by some other type of Yuletide project. He added that a committee has been set up to investigate.

A number of board members agreed that Santa Claus lane has lost some of its popularity since it first came into being in 1950 and that perhaps another Yuletide replacement should be sought.
