

Here's A Dinner To Eat On Porch

"The porch is also a wonderful spot for serving summer meals," said the Chef. "Especially if the family is trained to help bring out the food and clear the table and if one or two electric outlets are arranged so table cooking equipment can be plugged in.

"For example, imagine this summer day dinner served on the porch while the sun is setting."

Porch Dinner for Tomorrow: Relish gel saladettes, cold meat loaf, potato chips, bowls of succatash; peanut brittle duplex pie; hot or iced coffee or tea or milk.

All measurements are level recipes proportioned to serve 4 to 6.

Relish Gel Saladettes: Add 1 envelope unflavored gelatin to 2 tbs. cold water.

Boil together 1 c. water, 10 whole cloves and 1/4 c. granulated sugar for 5 min. Stir in the gelatin.

When dissolved, strain and add 1/4 c. pickle relish, 2 tbs. each fresh lime juice and lemon juice and 1/2 tsp. salt. Refrigerate until beginning to thicken. Then stir. Rinse an 8" square pan with cold water. Spoon in the relish mixture. Refrigerate 4 hrs., or until firm.

Cut in squares. Place on sliced lettuce and serve with boiled salad dressing or well-seasoned cottage cheese.

Peanut Brittle Duplex Pie: Bake a deep 9" American piecrust shell. Then make the filling.

Filling: Make up 2 pkgs. prepared homogenized dessert — 1 chocolate, the other vanilla, according to directions.

To the vanilla dessert, add 1 c. crushed peanut brittle. Leave the chocolate plain.

Spoon 2/3 of the chocolate dessert into the piecrust shell. Cover with 2/3 of the vanilla dessert. Refrigerate.

Serve spread with a thin layer of slightly sweetened whipped cream. Dust generously with crushed peanut brittle. Serve the day it is made.

Trick of the Chef: Press sauce tartare with cold meat loaf. Very tasty.

PARIS (AP)—Spectators stood up and cheered Thursday when Christian Dior, opening the French fall fashion showings, presented a group of tweed day dresses nearly ankle-length.

It was a daring trial balloon in the middle of a hippy, otherwise short-skirted collection launching the Magnet Line skirts, and they were called "The Magnet."

Prolonged applause marked the end of the showing. The style revolutionist of New Look fame seems to have carried off another sensationally successful coup.

After stringbean figures and flat chests, Dior has re-emphasized the bust, dropped necklines and stuffed the hips. If the hips are not actually padded, they are puffed out by skirts set in with soft folds at the natural waistline and narrowed at the hem. Dior calls them Dutch skirts, and they resemble a magnet with the rounded end upward.

THE DOUBLE MAGNET

Dior's Magnet Line rounds the shoulders and bust, fits neatly at the waist, and blooms out over the hips to narrow again at the hem. At least, this is the double magnet silhouette of most dresses and suits.

KEEP IN TRIM

Failure To Lose At Start Not Due To Fat Resistance

If you stepped on the scales hopefully this morning and read good news—perhaps 3 to 5 pounds gone—you will be happily content to stay with slimming fare. But if the pointer is stubbornly stuck at the same high mark, you are ready to pitch scales through the window—and eat with a vengeance.

Hold on! Failure to lose at the start of a diet is not due to any resistance on the part of the fat, your requirements and no loss is apparent, the cause is due to water retention in the tissues. During this period, the water which has resulted from the oxidation of food is held in the tissues. Since water weighs more than fat, naturally there is no evidence that you have reduced. Nonetheless, you've lost.

When the water balance adjusts, which it will within the week, a dramatic loss in weight follows. One fine morning, the pointer on the scales will plunge, perhaps many pounds.

By the way, water drinking has nothing to do with water retention. The best way to counteract the tendency to water retention is through less salt and increased protein. However, if you perspire freely, it is not wise to restrict.

Energy pick-up: Orange juice (3/4 cup), or skim milk or buttermilk or fresh fruit.

Dinner: Extra lean, ground round beef (1/4 lb. broiled); 1/2 oz. cheese (2 thin slices); bread 2 thin slices, mustard—lettuce, crisp celery and radishes; Mrs.—Buttermilk or skim milk, Mrs.—whole milk; ripe peach—large.

Note: If day is chilly, have American cheese, 1 oz. (1 slice thick) broiled on this slice of bread.
