Spanish Sherry Flavors Grilled Rock Lobster Tails

OLDFASHIONED sherry while in England, our American press group attended a fascinating party at the home of a beautiful auddier of Radiant House, headquarters of the South Western Gas Board, Bristol, England.

The stage was perfectly equipped for demonstrating. A large mirror was suspended from the ceiling over the table and ran so that every step shown by the demonstrator could be seen in the hands of the audience. Trays containing measured ingredients for the demonstration stood at hand on a tier of rolling shelves.

Meet the star—demonstrator Harold Wilshaw, Esq., VIP caterer of the United Kingdom, author of several cookbooks. The cooking star and special catering manager for the new restaurant and the entertainment interests of John Harvey and Sons, Ltd.

Mrs. Wilshaw deftly and quickly made several gourmet dishes, among them a sherry trifle (recipe tomorrow); Lobster a la Jerez (featured today) and a new way to prepare tortones described at the end of this column by the Chef.

ROBSTER A LA JEREZ

(Based on Mr. Wilshaw's recipe)

1 lb. fresh Atlantic rock lobster tails
1-1/2 c. melted butter
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. coarse-ground black pepper
1/2 c. dry Spanish sherry

Thaw rock lobster tails according to package directions. Using scissors, cut lengthwise down sides of membrane covering the meat. Wash and drain. Grasp tails in both hands and bend backward toward shell to crack and prevent curling. Brush generously all over with melted butter; dust with salt and pepper.

Arrange tails, shell-side up, in shallow pan. Place on preheated broiler, 5 in. from heat. Spoon over sherry.

Grill until meat turns and bastes generously with pan juices. Continue to broil 6 minutes.

Remove and keep hot.

Add remaining butter to pan. Stir in several spoonfuls of sherry until thickened; then spoon over tails.

Sprinkle with lemon wedges (Saffron rice is the accompaniment in Spain).

IC-REAMED PEARS

4 large halves canned pears
1 pint vanilla ice cream
1 rich chocolate sauce
1/2 c. toasted chopped blanched filberts or pecans

Chill pears. Cut each with 1 scoop ice cream. Place in chilled low sherbet dishes.

Spoon over chocolate sauce. Dust with nut meats and stirrer. Serve at once.
