

# Indians Widen Lead In Am. League; Bob Feller Wins 250

The Cleveland Indians boosted their American League lead to two and a half games Sunday with Brooklyn and Milwaukee swept past St. Louis to share the lead in the National League.

The Indians captured both ends of a doubleheader from Baltimore 14-3 and 2-1 in 12 innings for their 10th and 11th straight.

The Dodgers knocked off the lowly Pittsburgh Pirates twice 5-4 and 6-2 and Milwaukee whipped the Chicago Cubs 9-3 after taking the opener 4-2 in 10 innings.

Brooklyn and Milwaukee each has 20 victories and 14 defeats to lead the three clubs.

The Cardinals lost to Cincinnati 13-8. The victory moved the Redlegs into fifth place, a half game in front of the Philadelphia Phillies and only two percentage points behind the fourth-place New York Giants. The Giants burst into the first division by walloping the Philadelphia Athletics 9-4.

Chicago's White Sox, which strengthened their third base situation by purchasing George Kell from Boston, displaced the New York Yankees as runner-ups to Cleveland, edging out Detroit 4-3. The Yankees fell into third place: three and a half games behind the Indians, when they were out-slugged by the Red Sox 10-9.

Washington tied Baltimore for sixth place, defeating the Philadelphia Athletics 9-4.

**FELLER WINS 250TH**  
Bob Feller won his 250th game in the opener as his Cleveland mates made it easy for him with 16 hits. Rookie third baseman Rudy Regalado and outfielder Dave Phillips batted in four Cleveland runs and Al Rosen drove in three. Right-hander Art Houtteman won his own game in the nightcap with a 12th inning double that scored George Strickland, Baltimore's Bob Turley had a shutout until Rosen homered in the ninth to send the game into extra innings.

Scoring seven runs in the last three innings, the Red Sox overcame a 7-3 deficit to nip the Yankees in a three hour and 19 minute game. A total of 36 players were used, 20 by the Yankees. Kell, playing his last game for Boston, drove in three runs with

three singles. Ted Williams collected a pair of hits, walked three times and scored three times.

Blanked by Steve Gromek for seven innings, the White Sox broke loose for four runs on three home runs to sweep the three-game set with the Tigers. Minnie Minoso, whose three-run homer beat Detroit Saturday, hit another one with one man on base. Cass Michaels and Sherm Lollar also homered.

Mickey Vernon blasted a home run and three doubles to help the Senators defeat the Athletics. Dean Stone, relieving Connie Marrero in the fifth, hurled useless ball for five innings to register his first major league triumph.

**SNIDER: PAKFO STAR**  
Duke Snider clouted a pair of homers in the nightcap after Preacher Roe went the route for the first time this season in the Dodgers' double win. Roe, a notoriously weak hitter, doubled and singled and scored what proved to be the winning run in the opener.

Andy Pafko walloped two homers in Milwaukee's second game victory after driving in the winning run in the opener with a 10th inning double.

Wally Mays drove in three runs with a triple and single to enable the Giants to rout Curt Simmons and capture the series with the Phillies two games to one. Jim Hearn in relief, picked up his first triumph.

Wally Post, who hit two homers Saturday night, drove in five runs with a homer and double to give the Reds their second straight victory over the Cardinals. Five of Post's seven homers this season have been hit against St. Louis pitching.

## Hasty Road Winner Over Favorite In Preakness

BALTIMORE (AP)—Hasty Road led most of the way to defeat the heavily favored Correlation by a neck in a thrilling finish of the \$140,150 Preakness Stakes at Pimlico race course Saturday.

The 78th running of Maryland's classic was marred somewhat by a bumping contest an eighth of a mile from the finish and the crowd of 29,604 had to wait out a 15-minute delay as stewards looked at the films before rejecting a foul at the finish.

The foul claim was lodged by Arnold Kirkland, who rode Hasseyampa, the third horse across the finish line a length and a half behind the rangy Correlation, 4-10-5 favorite.

Hasty Road, second choice at 9-2 and owned by the Hasty House Farms of Md. and Mrs. Allie Reuben of Toledo, O., was put on the lead after the first eighth of a mile by veteran jockey Johnny Adams, who was winning his first Preakness.

**BUMPED SLIGHTLY**  
Correlation, owned by Robert H. Lytle of Los Angeles and ridden by Willie Shoemaker, ran ninth in the early part, then moved on the final furlong to challenge the leader.

Adams had Hasty Road near the rail as Correlation came charging up only heads apart, with Hasseyampa moving at the same time alongside the California colt.

Suddenly Hasty Road came out, and appeared to bump Correlation slightly. Hasseyampa—right behind—had no place to go.

Kirkland reigned up sharply, and had to take Hasseyampa, owned by the Walmac Farm of R. W. McIlvan, inside to the rail. He couldn't make it from there on in to the wire as the two leaders fought it out.

There was no objection against Hasty Road who toured the mile and three-sixteenths in 1:57 2-5 on a fast track. The Preakness record is 1:56 set by Capot in 1949.

**WORTH \$91,600**  
First place was worth \$91,600 to Hasty Road who had finished second to Determine in the Kentucky Derby. Correlation got \$25,000 for second; third place was worth \$15,000, and the fourth horse, Woodvale Farm's Goyamo, got \$7,500.

Hasty Road returned \$12, 33.20 and \$2.80. Correlation paid \$2.60 and \$2.40 and Hasseyampa \$4.40.

Hasty Road, who was bought for \$23,100 as a yearling, now has won a total of \$394,332 including \$277,132 last year, a record for a two-year-old.

Catching up with the hoax, General Manager Guy Moreau of Montreal Royals said he is trying to run down the calls or the persons responsible.

Moreau said calls went elsewhere, including several Montreal radio stations, and a check showed that sometimes a man's voice and at others a woman's announced the postponement. In one instance the man identified himself as "the groundskeeper."
