O'Shea to transfer to her certain interests which are menaced by bankruptcy proceedings which have been brought against him. ISLAND HORSES.—The Halifax Mail says: Heber Hatlin, of the Colonial market, returned from P. E. Island Saturday with a car of very fine horses. Several of the animals are to be used in connection with the city works, while a few will be offered for sale. The horses are all fine looking animals, and weigh from 1100 to 1500 pounds each. They were much admired to-day by the large number who visited the owner's stables. THE WOMEN RESIGN.—It is stated that the women recently elected municipal officers of the city of Elgerton, Kansas, have become disgusted with their newly acquired honors, and have resigned. They were elected originally as a joke. When they manifested a disposition to reform the old way of doing things, the men made such a racket that life became a burden to the women and they threw up the sponge. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, May 13. On motion of Mr. Daly, a bill extending the time for the completion of the Hudson Bay Railway, for five years from 30th June, 1891, was read and referred to the railway committee. The Northwest land subsidy resolutions were adopted after an amendment by Mr. Watson, asking that a maximum selling price be fixed, had been lost on a division of 48 to 83. The bill for the collection and publishing of labor statistics was read a third time and passed. After recess the resolutions respecting cash subsidies to railways were considered into committee. The railway resolutions being adopted, the House went into supply. General Laurier asked the attention of the Government to the heavy tax placed upon Canadian vessels desiring to take bait in Newfoundland, a tax which would amount to about half a million dollars for the season and was practically prohibitory, necessitating that vessels should come back to Canada for bait. He hoped the Government would spare no pains to secure an immediate remission of the duty. Sir John Thompson said that the matter had been attended to as far as possible by the Government, which had protested against the Act at the time of passage. It had been allowed by the imperial authorities only after the government of Newfoundland had given a solemn assurance that the act would not be enforced against Canada. It was a matter for surprise that the promise had been disregarded, and an attempt made to apply the Act to Canadian vessels, and the protest to the imperial government had been renewed. The House adjourned at 2.15.

Prorogation Expected.

OTTAWA, May 13. The impression now is that prorogation will take place on Saturday next. The only obstacle that at present exists is the bill dealing with Northwest affairs. If this comes up, a long discussion is sure to take place, which the Government do not want at this late stage of the session; so it is thought that this bill will be dropped, and there will be nothing, therefore, on the order paper to provoke any lengthy discussion. The estimates, with the exception of a few minor items, are passed. The railway subsidy resolutions are making rapid progress and without any lengthy discussion upon the same, and with these disposed of very little legislation remains to be done to finish up the work of the session. To hurry up the work, the Senate will hold a morning session besides its usual afternoon and evening sessions.

A Sensational Statement.

QUEBEC, May 13. A great sensation was created here to-day by the statement in Court of J. P. Whelan, the well known contractor, that he is obliged to pay Ernest Picaud, Premier Mercier's right hand man, \$10,000 to prevent the amount of the award made to Whelan in the Quebec Court house claims from being struck off the list.

Against Type-setting Machines.

OTTAWA, May 13. The Ottawa Typographical Union met to-night and passed resolutions condemning the Government proposing to introduce type-setting machines in the Government printing bureau. The denunciation was the Secretary of State to-night, who said he would look into the matter.

Fatal Explosion.

ROME, May 13. A quantity of balistite, a new explosive, exploded to-day at the factory for the manufacture of arms and munitions at Avigliani. Fourteen persons were instantly killed and many others injured, some fatally.

Smallpox.

HALIFAX, May 13. The Norwegian bark Esra, from Buenos Ayres, has arrived at Parrsboro in charge of the mate, Captain Neilson and one man having died of smallpox during the voyage.

Weather Bulletin.
