THE HOLLY HEATING SYSTEM.—The Springfield Gas Company has bought the right to use the Holly System of running steam pipes through streets of that city to furnish heat and power for adjoining buildings. The Holly system, which is owned at Lockport, N. Y., and is in most successful operation in that city, includes numerous improvements in the protection of the pipes laid in the streets, the arrangement of connections, valves, traps, etc. Steam is conducted two miles, and Mr. Holly claims that a distance of five miles can be reached. The pressure on the pipes in the streets is about fifty pounds and in the houses about ten pounds, although only one or two pounds is needed for heating. Lockport housekeepers say they hardly consider it necessary to clean house in the spring, while their houses had been heated throughout so thoroughly that they scarcely knew of the changes of temperature out doors. The steam is used for cooking, and is equal to almost any culinary operation except frying and broiling. Experiments have also been made in clearing sidewalks of snow by the use of steam, and the cost of melting a ton of snow is found to be but five cents. The steam distributed by this system has not been much utilized for power yet, but there can be no doubt that it is available, since the requisite pressure is kept up on the pipes, the engines of considerable size have actually been run by it. It is thought that connection can be made for sewing machines in private houses, for printing presses, coffee grinders and similar purposes.
