WEST PRINCE FIELD DAY
The Directors of the West Prince and District Artificial Breeding Club, in session, last Wednesday night in the Montrose Schoolhouse, decided to hold a field day on Wednesday, August 5th. This will be open to all interested livestock owners and their families in district. Details for the programme on the field day will be announced later. The arrangements for the field day are in the hands of the Committee headed by the Past President as Chairman, Allison MacIntosh and working with him are Chester Hayes, Hudson Pridham, who are Directors; the inseminator, Norman Warren and the Prince County Agricultural Representative, Allan Palmer.

HEN-HOUSE FLIES
Chickens are used to control flies at the poultry plant of the Riverside, Calif., agricultural experimental station.

There, two week-old cockerels were set to scratching in the droppings under laying cages of the station's poultry flock. The birds ate larvae that otherwise would evolve into mature flies.

Insecticides could not be used to control flies since part of the flock is used as a host for colonies of various insects under studies. Removing manure weekly proved too expensive.

When flies failed to appear in the manure patrolled by the cockerels, 1,500 house-fly eggs were planted in the droppings and comparable egg masses planted two

or three times a week thereafter. The manure was also wet to deliberately provide favorable fly-breeding conditions.

Fly larvae and pupae from the beginning were almost completely absent from the area. The cockerels were replaced after thirteen weeks by young stock. One cockerel per 20 hens is recommended.

HEREFORDS
The Hereford breed uses as its method of identification a tattoo only in the right or left ear, the herd and year letters. The maximum age for identification is before thirty days. A certain leeway is given up to six months for on range conditions. Membership in the Association is \$5.00

SHEEP
In sheep they are identified by tattoo or identification tags. Year or herd letter is designated with the allocation of the letters. The other ear used for the year letter. The identification tags are placed in the right ear. The maximum age for identification is prior to September 1st if born after September 1st and before December 31st.

Diefenbaker Rejects 'Go Slow' On Bomarc

OTTAWA, (CP) — Prime Minister Diefenbaker Monday rejected Opposition Leader Pearson's suggestion that Canada halt expenditures on the American Bomarc anti-aircraft missile until "apparent uncertainty" in Washington about North American air defence is cleared up.

"I do not agree with the suggestion of the leader of the opposition," Mr. Diefenbaker said in the Commons.

Defence Minister Peakes added that U.S. changes in continental defence "will not affect in any way the defence of Canada." Plans for construction of two Bomarc bases in Canada remained unchanged.

A few minutes earlier, Defence Production Minister O'Hurley confirmed that the government are: Membership \$2.00, registration—if in year born .75 cents for members and \$1.50 for non-members. contracts in Canada which might amount to a "substantial sum over the next few years."

Details of the transaction were worked out under Canada-U.S. arrangement for defence production-sharing.

Mr. Peakes said the U.S. defence department has decided to reduce the number of Bomarc and Nike-Hercules anti-aircraft missile batteries planned for the U.S. and to step up development of the Nike-Zeus counter-missile system.

"The proposed changes have taken full account of the effective integration of Canadian and U.S. air defences. (They) do not affect

our own defence position or the planned construction and employment of the Bomarc bases in Canada. Only U.S. bases are affected."

WALKOUT CALLED OFF

PARIS (AP) — A government threat to draft railway workers participating in any strike forced union leaders Monday to back down and call off a country-wide walkout, threatened for today. The union leaders backed down after they obtained promises from Transport Minister Robert Buron that the question of their wages would be taken up as soon as possible.

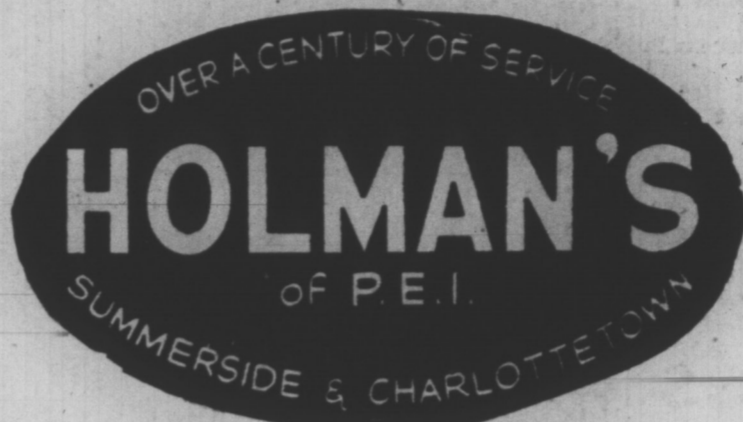
