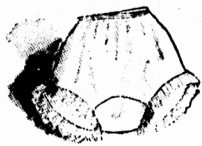

Educational Report

The following report was read by the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Arthur Roper:—
This year our assistance to schools took the form of prizes of \$5.00 each to five City schools. These were given for "Sustained Effort" and awarded to pupils of the higher grades at the discretion of the teachers.

To a nurse in training, we gave a bursary of \$150.00 to enable her to complete her course. This nurse is an orphan and the daughter of a veteran of World War I.

Once again a \$25.00 Scholarship was given to the Prince Edward Island Music Festival.

We also gave \$25.00 towards a Provincial Scholarship for Mr. Wendall MacKinnon to enable him to carry on his studies at Acadia University.

To the Princess Alice Foundation Fund we gave our annual \$5.00. On Armistice Day ten copies of suggested "Programmes for Children" were sent to one of the City schools; also on Empire Day ten more very fine programmes were sent to another of the larger city schools. On report of the teachers these programmes were greatly enjoyed by the various classes.

Our Chapter bought 50 calendars, thirty of which went to City and rural schools; twenty were bought by members of the Chapter.

Last fall we were privileged to have a visit from our National Educational Secretary Mrs. Detwiler, who arrived in the City October 23rd. A tea was held in the Y.M.C.A. Oct. 24th, to which the members of the four chapters in Prince Edward Island were invited to listen to an inspiring address given by Mrs. Detwiler. These visits from our national officers are all too few. They invariably draw us closer together in our work and make us feel our efforts, though small, are really worthwhile.

While Mrs. Detwiler was with us, we had a meeting of the Regents and Educational Secretaries, along with Mrs. Campbell, our Provincial Educational Secretary. At this meeting many problems were discussed and ways and means talked over the adoption of schools was thoroughly gone into and this next year should see a great advance in this line of work.

As your Educational Secretary I should like to pay tribute to the work of Mrs. Campbell. She is deeply interested in the educational work of our Order and of our Province. I feel sure this coming year will be a really worthwhile one along educational lines.

The Ways and Means Committee reported as follows:—

The second Robin Hood Cooking School, sponsored by the Earl of Hillsborough Chapter, I.O.D.E., on the days of Sept. 24-25-26, 1951, was again a most interesting, informative and successful event.

Through the generosity of the merchants and wholesalers in Charlottetown, and also the manufacturers in other sections of Canada, we found our prize list was even larger than ever, and to them we sincerely thank for their co-operation.

To every member of the Chapter I say thank you for your work in furthering our project and contributing to its success. Also to our master of ceremonies, Loman MacCauley, who proved to be an exceedingly bright entertainer.

Considering the stiff competition we encountered in the Cooking School field, our receipts were most gratifying, in as much as our advertising and other expenses were higher this year.

The Services at Home and Abroad report showed the amount of \$24.20 had been sent, in the way of money, food and clothing to British and European Children's Relief Fund; three families in England; Children's Hospital in Scotland, etc.

The accomplishments of the Empire and World Affairs Committee during the past year have been limited.

On April 9th, through the courtesy of the National Film Board the members of the Chapter were shown three films, namely: "Trooping The Color"; "Niagara Peninsula"; and "Road to Gaspe".

On November 19th a paper entitled "Canadian Scene" was read and following this there was a general discussion concerning Community activity and the tendency to eliminate "Royal" and "Dominion" from official use. It was felt by those assembled that rather than be eliminated the use of these should be further encouraged.

Thirty-five new books which were purchased through the Post War Service Fund were catalogued by Mrs. W. T. Rogers. Once again we thank Mrs. Rogers for her help.

Also through the Post War Service Fund the following magazines were distributed to the veterans at the Sanatorium: McLeans, Life, Readers Digest, Saturday Evening Post and Newswear.

Christmas gifts were given to three patients for their assistance in connection with the library.

I wish to thank all members for their assistance and willingness to help at all times.

Regent's Report

The Regent, Miss Marjorie Stewart read her report as follows:—

The year 1951 was a very busy one for our Chapter. After reviewing the minutes and the reports of the treasurer and of various committees I feel that we have indeed had a successful year. It seems as time goes on that we are being called upon more and more to assist in other matters outside our own immediate Chapter and in some instances outside of the work of our Order. This, while it involves additional responsibility and effort on our part, brings satisfaction to those participating.

Our main outside activity this year was the exhibition of Historic Relics that was shown during Festive Week. On that occasion we were glad to help the conventor, Mrs. Brehaut, of the Royal Edward Chapter, who gave so much of her own time to this interesting project. I would like this opportunity of thanking the members of this Chapter who supported me in this undertaking and helped so much to make the exhibition a success. It was a sacrifice on your part to give of your time in the summer season.

During the year we were sorry to have two members resign, Mrs.

Elmer MacDonald and Mrs. Wendell Barbour. In February we welcomed Mrs. Murray Mellish as a member, and at our May meeting we were happy to welcome three new members: Mrs. J. E. Burnett, Mrs. W. A. McMurtry, and Mrs. C. B. Porter.

It is gratifying to note that we were in the happy position, financially, to assist in several new undertakings as well as keep up our usual practice of sending food and clothing parcels overseas, and giving the usual donations to the various National Chapter funds. I refer to the \$25.00 we gave towards the new Provincial Scholarship, the \$150.00 given to assist a student nurse, also the gift to a deserving wife of a pensioner from World War I. We also contributed to the Sanatorium Radio Fund, and gave the usual scholarship to the Musical Festival Association and sent a parcel of good used clothing to a local family.

The Robin Hood Cooking School held in September was successful and the Chapter is indebted to Mrs. Rayner and the members of the Ways and Means Committee for their outstanding work in organizing and carrying through this project.

In October we were happy to welcome the National Educational Secretary, Mrs. Detwiler. I am glad that so many of you had the opportunity of meeting her and of hearing her speak. I regretted missing this privilege through being absent from the Province.

It was our extreme pleasure to see our beloved Princess Elizabeth and her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh during their visit here November 9th. Through the courtesy of the committee in charge of arrangements, members of the four Island Chapters had space reserved in front of the Province Building on this occasion. The four Standard Bearers were present with their flags and most of our members took advantage of the fine opportunity of seeing Their Highnesses.

and of hearing Princess Elizabeth deliver her address from the balcony of the Building.

It was my very special privilege at that time to be in the Confederation Chamber when the members of the Legislature and their wives were presented, and in turn, to have the signal honour of presenting the Princess with orchids from the Daughters of the Empire of this Province. It was an experience I shall never forget.

In closing I wish to thank all of you for your help and encouragement during the year. Special thanks go to the executive—I'm sure no Regent ever had a finer executive to work with. I would also like to express my appreciation to the regents of the other Chapters with whom we have cooperated on various occasions during the year, and to Miss Wray, our National Conventor, and to Mrs. Thane Campbell, the Provincial Educational Secretary.

We should be proud of our achievements during 1951 but should also look forward to the year upon which we are entering as a time when even better things may be accomplished. The aims and ideals of our organization are high, the opportunities for service are practically unlimited, and are deserving of nothing less than our very best efforts.

The above reports were all approved.

Discussions followed regarding maintaining the name "Dominion" in Dominion of Canada; also of the promotion of the founding of a museum for the Province of Prince Edward Island.

It was moved and seconded the amount of \$5.00 be paid our auditor; also that \$25.00 be donated to the Musical Festival.
