THE STANLEY got caught in the ice off the river yesterday while on her way to Charlotte and remained there all night. This afternoon the steamer made her way into Georgetown.

AT SOCIETY.—The Charlotte Drama Club will play "Robert Emmet" in St. Patrick's Hall, Soaris, on Wednesday evening, April 4th. A rare treat is in store for the good people of that place.

TEMPERANCE LECTURES.—Mr. F. S. Spence, the well-known temperance lecturer, is to be in Charlotte for one week, beginning on the 12th April next, and will deliver a series of lectures during his stay. He will be accompanied by Mr. Walker, of Toronto.

THEATRICAL.—The Charlotte Drama Club repeated the ever-popular Irish drama, "Robert Emmet," to a large audience last evening. As at the first performance, the play was put upon the boards in good form, and the various characters were well sustained. The specialties by Messrs. Whitlock and Pheasant, and the grand transformation scene at the close of the last act were greatly appreciated. Vincigorre's Orchestra was present and rendered some choice selections.

POLICE COURT.—This morning Benjamin Byers, (colored) was arraigned on complaint of his wife, charged with assault and battery. Mrs. Byers swore that on Monday night "Benny" caught her by the throat and choked her, and also slapped her in the face. "Benny" pleaded guilty of slapping her in the face, but denied the choking. His Honor fined him \$5 or 30 days. Patrick McMillan was fined \$1 and costs for annoying John Joseph Hogan in his dwelling, and one drunk countryman was fined \$2 or 10 days.

TALK ON ELECTRICITY.—Owing to the Prince Street School Concert being held on Friday evening, Mr. A. E. Morrison will give the second "talk" before the Y. M. C. A. to-morrow (Thursday) evening, at 8 o'clock. His subject will be "Electricity in the Service of Man." With the aid of diagrams and apparatus Mr. Morrison will show the experiments which led up to the telegraph, electric light, motors, telephone, etc., the method of working submarine cables, and the instruments used for locating breaks and taking measurements.

JOURNALISM AND LITERATURE.—Mr. DeLand calls journalism "the big brother of literature." What he meant as sarcasm is a fact. Journalism is the big brother without whose aid ninety-nine literatures out of a hundred could not live. This is the age of daily brains. Those who fancy that book and magazine writers are superior to journalists, would revise their opinions did they realize how many more words to ideas are found in most books and most magazine articles than in newspapers where space is of far more importance. Journalism is driving so-called literature out of the market. The people are the gainers. When their taste becomes classic the newspaper will be classic, too, even in the wording of murders and prize fights.—Kate Field's Washington.

RAILWAYS IN NEW SOUTH WALES.—The progress and importance of a colony may well be judged by the length of its railways in regard to population, and viewed in this way the colony of New South Wales stands out strongly in favorable comparison with other countries. It has a population, speaking generally, of 4,134,297 people, which density by colonial railway mileage, gives one mile of line for every 475 persons. In Great Britain there are 1,908 persons to each mile of line; in France 1,745; in Germany, 1,845; in the United States, where they have done more in regard to railway enterprise than any other country in the world, one mile to every 215 persons; in the adjoining colony of Victoria there is one mile to every 413 persons. During the last 10 years the increase in population has been 365,000, equal to 50 per cent., and although the number fluctuates, still the percentage of increase may be taken as a fair basis of comparison, and it may reasonably be assumed that a similar increase will be maintained in the coming 10 years. On that basis, therefore, the colony can provide for an additional length of 1,190 miles of new lines in the next 10 years, or an average increase of 119 miles per annum.

The total private wealth of Australasia is about \$1,169,454,000, being equivalent to \$289 per head, and is distributed as follows: New South Wales, \$412,484,000—\$288 per head; Victoria, \$344,224,000—\$304 per head; Queensland, \$117,414,000—\$261 per head; South Australia, \$99,141,000—\$310 per head; Western Australia, \$19,619,000—\$218 per head; Tasmania, \$24,360,000—\$236 per head; New Zealand, \$156,192,000—\$224 per head. From this it will be seen that New South Wales is, both collectively and individually, the richest of the Australian colonies.
