## Commission Revokes CDP's Thursday Race

The licence of Charlottetown Driving Park officials to conduct a harness racing program this Thursday, June 28 has been cancelled by the Prince Edward Island Sports and Racing Commission.

Charlottetown Driving Park officials were notified yesterday by letter signed by Somerset Kelly, the commission secretary. The letter also stated that "further legal action" would be taken against the Charlottetown track.

The penalty came about as a result of a race held last Thursday June 21 at the CDP. Summerside Raceway was scheduled to go Wednesday June 20 but

management asserted that they had a licence to operate that night and they stated that they intended to go ahead with their race which they did. Summerside also conducted their program but they had the "green light" from the three-man commission.

Cecil J. Stewart, president of the Charlottetown Driving Park and the Provincial Exhibition Association had no comment concerning the commission's most recent ruling.

This Thursday's race had been advertised as a special event track conditions forced a postponement. The Charlottetown track had authority from the commission to race Thursday June 21.

In the afternoon on June 21, the officials of the Charlottetown track were advised not to conduct a race that night. The CDP with proceeds going to the Gold Cup and Saucer committee. Last night's scheduled card at Charlottetown was rained out and is rescheduled for tonight.
