BASTER SHOW, 1854.

We promised to give some further remarks on the state of the Market on Saturday night, and in order to make our description as correct as possible, the writer went to every stall in the Market, and counted and compared the weight of the articles on the Monday, stating the kinds of meat exhibited by them, and the weight of each respectively, two only, however, Messrs. Beer and Holman, have responded to our invitation; we shall, nevertheless, give the results, as far as we are able, from information afforded by the Secretary of the Royal Agricultural Society. In the first place, it becomes our duty to notice the want of accommodation in the present Market House. The display of meat, which have been much more extensive, than we could possibly accommodate in a better term than was getting of necessity, of the sections where there was no place of view of the articles on all sides, in a proper light. We say it of our not being able to picture to you the variety of fine, well-fledged, and plump, the lean delicately mottled, and finely streaked with fat, as if there had been a generous combat as to which should obtain the superiority, and the fancy of intermediate shades between the yellow whiteness or rich yellow it does form a picture which were as fierce from contemplating, and which all are desirous of possessing, and is, therefore, worthy of a special exhibition notice. The greatest connoisseurs, and the most critical critics would have found much to admire, and little to condemn in the Exhibition. There is always a diversity of opinion in matters, which depend solely on peculiar taste of individual, and therefore we shall not obtrude our private judgment as to what was the finest best exhibited. We heard the opinion of our own countrymen, and we will give the estimate of the respective merits of each, and we will not attempt to find the opinion almost as various as the articles to be adjudged upon; in fact, they were all dependent on the eye, and the ear, of their kind—or, to speak more technically, on price. There were people from all parts of the Mother Country, from the other Colonies, and they had been in the United Kingdom for some time, and were present; and all unanimously agreed that they had seen better articles, of their size and kind, elsewhere in any market. We are particular in mentioning this, as it is a fact, and we will give you a specimen of the excellence of the fat of the same, as shown in Britain and elsewhere. Without incurring the suspicion of partiality, we think, we should not do our duty if we did not refer to the appearance exhibited by Mr. Holman, last prize, 2d class, which was remarkable from being only one year and three months old, and weighed when killed 17 lbs. Our ears were charmed by the excellence of the fat of the same, as shown in the Exhibition; and we think that the carcass of the same exhibited at the Show by John Lyall, Esq., and purchased and shown by Holman, was the fattest, and best, we ever saw, which we have ever seen, and we are satisfied that a bunch of that animal, judiciously kept for about a month or six weeks, and enveloped in a coarse paste and cooked as venison, would have done better than any other of the kind in the present Amphitryon among us. There was other motion, however, that did credit to their feeders and exhibitors. There was not much poultry, though there

were a few turkeys, fowls and geese. Some would give us these: They were disappointed at seeing no veal at that day; though we have seen some previously, and of a superior quality. On the whole, however, we do not regret to see the market, as a general improvement, and taken place within these few years, in stock of all kinds. We gladly record this state of the market; for it is more than any other, and it is a sign of the prosperity of the Colony, and will tend to induce us, with limited incomes, in other and more extensive countries, to remove to Prince Edward Island, seats of raising all the necessaries of life, and most of the luxuries of life, within their reach and the means of it.
