Former Island Man Heads Faculty Group At Grinnell, Ia.

GRINNELL, Ia.—Prof. R. Homer, chairman of the history department, has been elected chairman of the Grinnell college faculty.

Mr. Norton, who was elevated to full professorship this year, has been at Grinnell college since 1930, coming at that time from an instructorship at Regina college in Saskatchewan, Canada. He was a Rhodes scholar.

He has held summer professorships at Iowa State Teachers College and the University of Nebraska. He holds degrees from Dalhousie University and Oxford University.

As chairman of the Grinnell faculty, Mr. Norton will be automatically chairman of the budget committee and ex-officio member of all faculty committees, as well as official spokesman in general for that body.
