

British Corporal Wins DCRA Grand Aggregate

SOUTH MARCH, Ont. (CP)—A 25-year-old British corporal Friday won the grand aggregate standing at the 88th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize shoot.

Cpl. A. J. Tetlow, a member of the 15-man British rifle team, defeated more than 600 Canadian competitors to win the DCRA silver cross and \$30 in cash.

Earlier in the day, Tetlow walked off with a challenge cup and gold watch by posting the highest score in the City of Ottawa match fired from 200 and 900 yards.

He won the grand aggregate standing by posting a score of 611-14 points of the possible—in the Connaught, Bankers', MacDougall, Macdonald, the qualifying stage of the governor-general's match and the 200 and 900 yards in the City of Ottawa match.

DECIDES BIBLEY TEAM
Top aggregate scored during the week are added to those posted in

the final stage of the governor-general's match and from this comes Canada's 1935 Bibley team.

Capt. H. N. Cooper, 23-year-old adjutant of the British rifle team finished in runner-up position in the grand aggregate. He carded a combined score of 606 to win a \$25 cash prize. Sgt. J. H. Blais of Montreal was third with a score of 601 and won a silver medal for carding the highest score among the Quebec marksmen.

Pte. J. J. Pearson of Montreal, and Sgt. Ldr. Dave Reynolds of Ottawa, tied with 599.

Tetlow led the field in the City of Ottawa match with a score of 98 of a possible 100, firing 10 rounds from each of the 200 and 900-yard ranges.

He scored a possible 50 from the shorter distance and carded 48 of a possible 50 from the longer range for his winning score. Three other marksmen tied with 97. They were Sgt. E. C. Armstrong, Ottawa, Sgt. A. S. Emery, Saint John, N. B., and Surgeon Lieut. M. F. C. Walker of the British rifle team.

Canada evened the score with Britain Friday by winning the Commonwealth match from 900 and 1,000 yards. Thursday, the British rifle team beat out Canada in the Canada match with a score of 1,131 of a possible 1,200. The Canadians finished with 1,128.

In the Commonwealth match, the eight-man Canadian team posted a combined score of 671 of a possible 800 to finish ahead of the British team which carded 665.

Lieut. V. V. Hall, Camp Borden, Ont., and Sgt. H. Kayne of Montreal split first prize money in the 900-yard seven events a team. They swapped in seven consecutive bulls eyes.

QUEBEC BEATS N. S.
An eight-man team from Quebec won the London Merchants' Cup in a provincial competition. The team posted a combined score of 497 of a possible 600 firing 15 rounds from the 1,000-yard range to beat out a Nova Scotia team which placed second with a score of 491.

OTTAWA, (CP)—Ontario defeated Quebec 3-2 Friday to win the Canadian women's interprovincial team matches at the opening day of the sixth annual Canadian junior tennis championships.

Earlier, a men's team from Quebec defeated Nova Scotia 3-0 with three straight singles for the male title.

The teams competition, highlight of the all-Canadian championships at the tourney, are decided on the best of three singles and two doubles.

Quebec forced Ontario all the way in the women's while the Quebec men had an easy win over Nova Scotia.

CHICAGO (AP)—Minnie Minoso's triple, scoring Nellie Fox from first in the 16th inning, broke up a brilliant pitched duel between Jack Harshman and Al Aber and gave Chicago White Sox a 1-0 victory over Detroit Tigers Friday.

Chicago Carrasquel opened the home 16th with a single. Fox at bat pitched to sacrifice but forced Carrasquel to misplay, then hit his three-baser and Fox raced home to end the three-hour, 50-minute marathon.

Owned by J. K. Curran and driven by Don MacNeill, Ann's Dream paced the first heat in 2:10 2-5 and came back to win the third heat after Joe Hennessy drove Gahagan to victory in the second heat.

Frisko Guy, owned by Harry O'Brien, Alberton, and driven by Earle Semple, won two heats of the 2:25 Pace and Ronald G. one. Both horses set new records with Ronald G. lowering his mark five and 2-5 seconds.

David G. took top honors in the Classified Pace winning the first and second heats. Dale B. won the third heat. David G. also lowered his mark to 2:14 2-5 in winning the first heat.

Abbeand and Lusty's Lass again showed their superiority in the 2:25 Pace and the 2:16 Pace winning the final heats of each race. The dashes were carried over from the previous day's programme and raced off before the regular day's races got underway.

Sir Francis Drake was a surprise winner in the 2:19 Trot. The favored Sir Chuck, who got away to a bad start did not finish when he and Derrick were involved in an accident at the turn onto the back stretch on the second trip around.
