WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., April 22 (AP)—Col. Granville Roland Fortesque, 76, soldier, author, dramatist and one-time military aide to President Theodore Roosevelt, died today after a long illness. Fortesque wrote several books relating to the First World War. His plays included "Dolores" in 1914, "Love and Live" in 1921, "The Unbelievers" in 1925 and "Frontline and Deadline" in 1937. At one time he was fiction editor of Liberty magazine.
