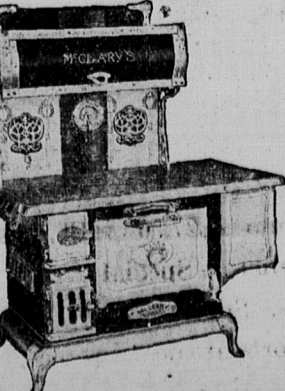

This mare was a green pacer, which made quite a sensation among the horsemen at Charlottetown when she stepped away in second position to the quarter in 22 seconds, the half in 1.07, and finished close up in 2.15 1/4, not a bad showing for a young mare that never was harnessed until 15 months ago, and never saw a race track or sulky until 4 months ago, which she had suffered from an attack of strangles. Mr. Ramsay had many tempting offers from horsemen for this mare, ranging from \$500 upwards, but great credit is due Mr. Scoble for securing her at the handsome sum of \$750, and thus retaining some reliable speed on the island. IN MEMORIAM NARCISSE GALLANT. At his home in St. Gilbert on Sunday morning, Sept. 25th, there passed peacefully away Narcisse Gallant at the advanced age of 82 years. 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NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Services in the Greek orthodox church at 155 Cedar street yesterday were broken up by a fire for all fight, among the congregation, which resulted in the death of Nicholas Varzakokos, 40, a wealthy Greek fig merchant and a trustee of the organization. The cause of his death has not yet been officially ascertained. George Varzakokos, the dead man's 18 year old son, told the police that the sexton of the church held his father's hands while the priest, Rev. Kerido Varradakis, hit him over the head with a candlestick. Dr. Benj. N. Vance, assistant medical examiner, declared, however, that there were no marks on the merchant's body and expressed the belief that he may possibly have died from a heart attack brought on by the excitement. An autopsy will be performed tomorrow. The priest and eight members of the congregation were taken to a police station and questioned, but all were later released. The priest and sexton, however, were served with summonses to appear at the District Attorney's office tomorrow morning for further questioning.

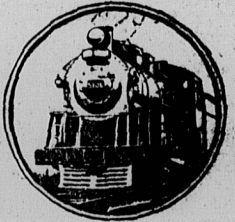

The repairs to the building and replacement of equipment will be fully as great if not greater than last year, and in every way possible the trustees are trying to provide a thoroughly equipped Hospital where our sick may receive as good treatment as can be obtained in any Hospital in Canada.

All of this takes money, a very great deal of money, and we therefore strongly appeal to you for every dollar you can possibly afford to give us.
