Tignish Man Re-elected To Head Fish, Game Ass'n

Mr. Omer Bernard of Tignish was re-elected president of the Prince County Fish and Game Protection Association at the annual meeting held in the civic building in Summerside last evening.
Mr. Bernard assumed office in January of this year when the president, Dick Found was elected president of the Provincial Fish and Game Association. Fred Semple, Kensington, was re-elected vice-president, and Norman E. MacLeod, Jr., of Summerside secretary-treasurer.

April 27, 1950. The direction for an accounting was restated to require segregation of the accounts between Harry Winchester and the Company and those affecting Nelson Rattenbury and his estate and giving specific directions for the basis of the accounting.

The principal issue of law concerned the validity of an alleged sale and transfer of two pieces of real estate by the late Nelson Rattenbury to N. Rattenbury Ltd. in 1908 and its effect on a mortgage of the same properties executed by Nelson Rattenbury to the appellant, Harry Winchester, on March 8, 1935, registered July 8, 1937. There was no deed but the sale would have been good in equity. The properties were subsequently sold, however, to other parties who accepted a good title.

The Registrar states that "no constructive or other notice of an unregistered... deed... shall... defeat... any deed or mortgage... which shall have been duly registered..."

Whether or not the limitation of the section to cases where constructive or similar notice is involved would be a proper construction to put on the section in cases where actual notice existed, the Chief Justice ruled that, "the suggested interpretation is imperative in cases where the actual notice is of such a kind as would render the conduct of a subsequent purchaser fraudulent or unconscionable. For throughout the cases on registration, there is discernable the principle that such enactments should be accorded a reasonable, rather than a literal, interpretation, and that a Registry Act, as the Statute of Frauds, is not intended to become an instrument of fraud."

Lord Redcliffe said of the Irish Act. It was never the intention of the legislature to give a priority of right to commit a fraud...

"Applying the principle to s.34 of our Registry Act of 1937, we must limit the scope of the expression 'purchasers and incumbrancers' to those who become purchasers and incumbrancers in good faith—to those who bona fide acquire title on the strength of the register. Can this be said of the present appellant, who, himself a director of the Company, acquired his registered title with full knowledge of the Company's prior equitable title? I think not."

Later the Chief Justice says, "Numerous cases have decided that, in the absence of express provision, a registered title does not prevail over a prior equitable title of which the purchaser or incumbrancer had notice and which is of a nature that it cannot be, or need not be, registered. The Chief Justice also found that there had been no valid confirmation of the transaction by the directors or the liquidators of the Company."

The term "connected load" used with reference to the commercial rate has to do with the potential consumption of the customer based on what it would be if he were operation all his apparatus at one time.

The ruling handed down yesterday did not include the reasons on which the new rates are based but it is presumed that these will be filed by the commission at a later date.

Schmidt's presence may make all the difference in the world to the Bruins, who lost 4-2 to Montreal Canadiens Thursday night in the opening game of the best-of-seven final.

CHICAGO, (AP)—Chicago Cubs had good news from the hospital Friday concerning outfielder Hank Sauer and shortstop Roy Smalley.

Sauer, the National League's most valuable player in 1952, had splints removed from his fractured right little finger and will be able to try batting practice Monday or Tuesday. He fractured the finger in a slide to first base March 16 at Fullerton, Calif.

Smalley, hobbling on an ailing right ankle, underwent a physical check-up which showed nothing organically wrong with him. However, an inflamed tendon on the troubling ankle will require several more weeks' rest.
