

Tiger-Cats Shade Argos; Cosentino In Hero's Role

HAMILTON (CP) — Frank Cosentino, a 24-year-old Canadian quarterback, stole the limelight from import Joe Zuger by coming off the bench in the third quarter to fire two touchdown passes that gave Hamilton Tiger-Cats an uphill 27-24 victory over Toronto Argonauts in their Eastern Football Conference game Sunday before 23,500 fans.

The win shot Tiger-Cats back into undisputed possession of first place by two points over Rough Riders in their tight battle for the bye into the league finals. Each has two games to play in the 14-game schedule.

The last-place Argos, in going down to their ninth loss against only three wins, still have a slim chance to catch Montreal Alouettes for the third and last playoff berth. The Alouettes,

who tied Ottawa 21-21 Saturday, Cosentino, in front of Argos, was three times against each other at Montreal.

Cosentino, a former University of Western Ontario star, came through for Hamilton after Zuger ran into passing trouble under a relentless rush by the Argo defensive line and linebackers.

Zuger, who threw a record eight touchdown passes against

Saskatchewan Roughriders last Monday 21-14, started off strongly but he didn't have the magic touch and when Tiger-Cats fell behind 24-13 in the third quarter coach Jim Trimble called in Cosentino.

The six-foot-five homebrew Tiger-Cats back into the game on his first play with a touchdown pass to Dick Eastery, a new import halfback playing in his second Canadian game. Cosentino tossed a 21-

yard pass to Eastery who ran for another 50 yards in a 71-yard play that gave the Tiger-Cats a big lift.

The converted touchdown cut Toronto's lead to four points and Tiger-Cats erased that with an early fourth-quarter touchdown. Cosentino passed 39 yards to speedy Garrey Henley, who made a spectacular leaping end-around catch with Argonauts Ben Morris practically draped around him.

Maple Leafs Beat Bruins; Frank Mahovich Pots Pair

BOSTON (CP) — Toronto's Bob Fidler stole the puck at centre ice and scored on a 33-footer after Frank Mahovich had tied the game as the Maple Leafs handed Boston Bruins a 4-1 National Hockey League defeat in a wild third period Sunday night.

Mahovich scored his second goal into an open net just before the finish. The winning play came as Fidler took the puck right off defenceman Teddy Green's stick, skated in unshowered and lifted a forehead shot which went into the far corner. The goal was Fidler's first of the year.

The defending Stanley Cup champions had taken an early 2-1 lead, then fallen behind 2-2 after two evens.

Dick DuFour evens matters 3-3 with the final period only 33 seconds old when his pass-out from the corner hit Green on the back of the leg and came into the net.

In the ensuing minute Boston rookie Wayne Hicks fired a rebound under diving Leafs goalie Johnny Bower and Mahovich answered with a 15-foot screened backhand making it 4-4.

Mahovich, also assisted on a goal. Eddie Litzenberger also had a goal and an assist for the winners whose other tally was by George Armstrong.

Murray Oliver, Wayne Connelly and Guy Gendron also scored for Boston.

The Bruins were shorthanded with Green in the penalty box when the Leafs opened the scoring at 12:17 of the first period. Horton's 45-foot shot was deflected past Perreault to the right corner by George Armstrong.

TIED IT UP

The Bruins tied the game to little more than half a minute later with Oliver taking the last of a volley of shots at Johnny Bower just after he had made a stop as he slid across the goalmouth.

"The Leafs again took the lead late in the opening period when Litzenberger steered home a screened shot by Mahovich from the left centre.

The Bruins came back to tie the game at 22:41 of the middle period when Connelly connected on a sharp 10-foot play from a slight angle in front of the net. He was fed by Murray Oliver who dug the puck out of the corner as the Leafs lost it in the zone.

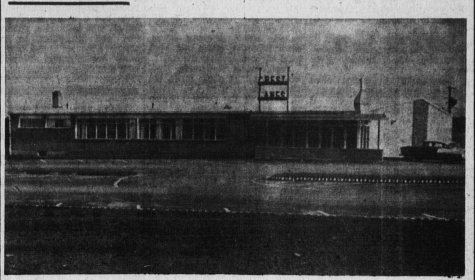

Canadiens And New York Battle To Tie At Gardens

NEW YORK (AP) — Montreal Canadiens came from behind three times Sunday night, the last on a goal by Gordon Benson, for a 3-2 National Hockey League tie with New York Rangers.

The Rangers, who have won only one in five starts this season, had leads of 1-0, 2-1 and 3-2 before Benson got the tying goal early in the last period.

He finished in from the right and made a quick flip from about 20 feet out, the puck dribbling off the pads of Ranger

goalie Gump Worsley into the far corner of the net.

The game was one of marked contrast, with first one team and then the other dominating play.

New York outshot the Canadiens 15-6 in the first period, while the Canadiens had a wide 8-2 edge in the final period.

Each team had four power play opportunities in the first, second, and neither could take advantage.

The Rangers went up 1-0 on Andy Bathgate's goal at 1:35 of the first period, the first of this season New York's No. 1 line had produced a goal.

Gilles Tremblay matched that early in the second period, but Camille Henry's marker five

minutes later gave New York a 2-1 lead. Jean Beliveau tied it again before the period was over.
