THE MAGIC CIRCLE.—The excitement regarding this strange phenomenon increases daily. A few weeks ago we gave a description of the mystery as it appeared to the few persons who had then visited it. Latterly various reports have reached us, but it was not until this morning that our Reporter (who regrets that he was not present at the time) gleaned information, from a perfectly trustworthy source, of the very extraordinary proceedings that from time to time take place at this "abode of the haunted." Last midnight several of our most curious citizens—a lawyer, a sporting J. P. from Prince County, a policeman, a livery stable keeper, and several other gentlemen left for the scene of mystery. Arriving there, they carefully took their positions, and awaited events, which were not long coming. One of them was engaged with a lantern examining the track of the circle, when suddenly the light was snatched from his hands, himself thrown back by a current of air, caused by a swiftly moving body, and, before he could recover himself, again appeared an object revolving, about 40 feet high, resembling nothing in human shape, but like a tree with its branches below, but a few above. Several others of the party observed the same apparition. This gentleman, however, being more courageous than the rest, was bound to examine the track, and thus experienced more than his companions. Whatever it may be, there still remains an explanation to be made. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

THE NEWS FROM EUROPE.

London, July 6. Intense heat prevails throughout Europe. At Paris yesterday the thermometer was 93 in the shade. The Chamber of Deputies discussed proposals to sit during the early hours of forenoon or after sunset. At Aldershot on Monday, during the sham fight, four soldiers died from sunstroke, and several others are in a precarious condition. Great electrical disturbance and rain prevail in London to-day.

Paris, July 6. The Senate has adopted an amendment to the Compulsory Education Bill, which alters its character and imperils its passage. The amendment which was offered by M. Jules Simon, provides that elementary schoolmasters shall teach pupils their duties towards God and their country. The moderates left and right supported the amendment, which was carried by a vote of 159 to 125, in spite of the strenuous opposition of Premier Ferry. The Chamber of Deputies will probably reject the amendment, which destroys the secular character of the bill.

London, July 6. The situation of affairs in North Africa are beginning to excite grave disquietude and distrust. The Post, commenting on the news, says that France intends to mobilize 120,000 troops and to demand fresh credits from Chambers. This news is of extreme gravity and may lead to serious complications.

Paris, July 6. It is affirmed that France has sent a note to the Porte declaring she will hold Turkey responsible for the agitation among Mohammedans in Tunis and Oran. A battalion of the Lyon's garrison is preparing to go to Sfat to participate in the occupation of that place.

UNITED STATES.

New York, July 6. In an interview last night, Sir Edward Thornton, who left Washington yesterday and sails for England to-day said, "I think President Garfield will get well. I left Washington at two o'clock, and before starting I called at the White House. All the reports were so favorable that I shall sail feeling that he will pull through." When asked "What will be the tone of European comment on the attempted assassination?" Sir Edward replied: "Well, they do not understand the circumstances over there as we do. This Guiteau is a low, base fellow, evidently of tremendous vanity, who thought to England, or Consul General. Although he is ignorant, I don't think anybody is concerned in the crime with him. One saddening thought that has come into my mind often of late is that there seems to be a sort of a spirit running over the world inspiring mad men with the idea that governments can be changed by killing the rulers, and there seems to be no remedy. Perhaps a good plan to cure it would be that followed in England toward the lunatics a number of years ago who occasionally shot at the Queen for the fun of the thing. They were locked up in prison and flogged at intervals. Before that locking them up did not seem to do much good, but the disgrace of the whipping excited a curative effect. The Queen has not been fired at since."

EXECUTIVE MANSION, July 6. Midnight (unofficial). The President has passed a most comfortable day and his condition to-night is as satisfactory as could be expected. He has taken more nourishment during the past 18 hours than for any time since he was wounded. The food has all been retained and perfectly assimilated. In order to relieve him as far as possible of the oppression caused by the intense heat, the attending physicians this evening put into operation a simple refrigerator apparatus which, it is thought, will render the atmosphere of his room to-morrow much more comfortable than it has been to-day.

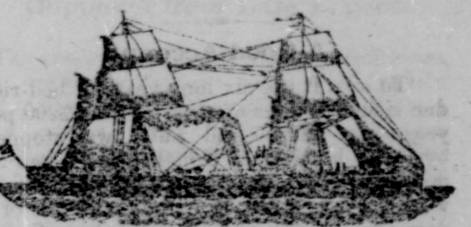
