DOMINION PARLIAMENT
NOTES OF THE SESSION.
PLEA FOR RAILWAYS FOR CAPE BRETON.
A few days ago, writes the *Globe* reporter,
Mr. Cameron, of Inverness, Cape Breton,
moved for a statement of the amounts
charged against the public debt on account
of expenditures on railways, canals, &c., in
the different Provinces. He spoke at some
length, complaining of the neglect of Cape
Breton in this respect. He dealt with the
history and resources of Cape Breton, and
contrasted its slow progress with the de-
velopment of Prince Edward Island, attrib-
uting the backwardness of the former to
the neglect, not only of the Government of
Nova Scotia, but of the Government of the
Dominion. He declared that Cape Breton
would be satisfied with one-half the amount
expended on railways in Prince Edward
Island. "If I had control of this money,"
he said, "I would spend one million in
building a railway from the Strait of Canso
to Sidney or Louisbourg, and \$675,000 in
building a road from the Strait of Canso to
Cape North." He went on to say that since
the introduction of the N. P. the population
of Cape Breton had not increased rapidly,
but he did not, by any means, attribute
this to the tariff. The difficulty, according
to his opinion, was that the benefits of the
N. P. were not sufficiently diffused through-
out that island. What they wanted was
not only increased duties, but that one
other part of N. P.—the improvements of
the means of communication. He quoted
figures to show that the output of coal from
Cape Breton in 1883 was 300,000 tons
more than in 1878, and declared that this
was due to the N. P. Were the roads he
advocated built, he contended that an in-
crease of not less than 40,000 in the popula-
tion would ensue; which at \$3 per head—a
small calculation—which give a revenue
which would not only pay the interest on
the investment in railways he proposed, but
would yield a handsome yearly profit be-
sides. Mr. McDonald, of Cape Breton,
supported the resolution, and Mr. Brecken,
of Prince Edward Island, said a few words
to prove that that island had paid for its
own railway. Mr. Blake took occasion to
throw out the suggestion that, as the por-
tfolio of Railways was about to become
vacant, the mover of the resolution and his
colleague should agitate to have it filled
from Cape Breton.

Canadian Finances.
(From the *Monetary Times*.)
Results, it cannot be denied, have fairly
vindicated the Tariff Policy. As an in-
strument for producing revenue, the tariff
has exceeded the expectations alike of
friend and foe. The consolidated revenue,
which did not of course all come from
customs, was \$33,383,000, and the expendi-
ture \$27,067,000 last year; the surplus
being 6,316,000. Under ordinary circum-
stances, a surplus is on abnormal thing and,
when large, is generally the result of a mis-
taken estimate of the year's revenue. Sir
Leonard Tilley has produced a surplus by
deliberate design, on grounds of
which he stoutly defends. The

But the moral effect of the demonstration
of financial strength is worth something.
The Minister of Finance feels a natural
pride in seeing Canadian securities at the
head of the colonial list. This fact is partly
due to the financial strength which the
country has shown under the present tariff.
Not that the varying prices of securities
always afford an indication even of the re-
lative value, at different times, of these
securities. A better test is the average
dividend, when they are dividend-paying.
The price of government securities and the
rate of interest they bear, afford a test of
of the credit of the country, and it is
gratifying to see the credit of the country
stand higher to-day than ever it stood
before.
Financial.
The *Montreal Herald*, of the 3rd inst., in
its financial article says: "Monetary circles
are at the moment in a quiet way condition
and the outlook is more encouraging for a
brisk spring business." The *Witness* of the
same date says: "The case in the money
market still continues, there being plenty
of money to be had on miscellaneous securi-
ties at 6 per cent on call, and some few
loans on bank stocks have been reported at
the same rate. Commercial borrowers find
little difficulty in obtaining all the money
necessary for the requirements of the trade
at seven per cent."
The *St. John Telegraph* says: "These
features will be noted with satisfaction by
business people generally. Montreal being
the business centre of the Dominion, we
may accept the tendency of the financial
market there is indicative of its probable
character in the immediate future all over
Canada. It to be forewarned is to be fore-
armed against a commercial stringency, the
business people of Canada ought to be pre-
pared in advance for any temporary period
of depression, since the press has been faith-
ful in sounding notes of warning. It is
certainly a great cause for congratulation
that the prospects even of a temporary de-
pression, which many thought imminent,
are diminishing. We say temporary, for
it seems impossible that in a growing coun-
try like this, any commercial or financial
stringency can be otherwise of short
duration."
