### DARING AND SUCCESSFUL SURGICAL OPERATION.

Our correspondent at Campbellton states that on Friday, the 5th inst., a remarkable operation was performed by Dr. Balcom, of Campbellton, assisted by Dr. Venner on the person of Archibald Chatteran, a young man of about twenty years of age, belonging to that place. Young Chatteran had been suffering for some time with consumption, his right lung being completely softened and broken down, with the exception of a small portion at the top. His death was hourly expected for several weeks past. Dr. Balcom concluding that he could not, in the course of things, recover, resolved to open his chest, which he did by making a deep incision at the lower end of the shoulder blade, and inserted a silver tub, through which he drew out about two quarts of exceedingly offensive matter, and afterwards washed out the cavity thoroughly with disinfectants. The patient experienced immediate relief, his strength and appetite have returned in a great measure, and he is now able to walk about the house, whereas before the operation he could not turn himself in bed. From the marked success of the operation, and the fact that the patient's left lung is apparently sound, his friends now entertain strong hopes of his recovery. Dr. Balcom claims that this is the first operation of the kind performed in the Province. It certainly reflects much credit on his skill and courage as a surgeon.—St. John Telegraph.

There has probably never been a public man in Canada who took greater delight in popular political gatherings than the present Premier, but he found it convenient to abandon the picnic campaign, arranged for him this summer, before it was completed, and left the people both of North and South Bruce to make up their political opinions without the assistance of his eloquence. The ill temper which he displayed in the picnic speeches which he did deliver, clearly indicated that he had been badly hurt by the shafts of his opponents, and that political picnicking with a long list of official blunders to defend was not the enjoyable recreation which he used to find when he had only the acts of his opponents to criticize. Time was when the lightest word which fell from Mr. Blake's lips in public was reported with scrupulous care by the leading organ of the party, but the great speech which he delivered at Teeswater has been carefully hidden under a bushel. It has been described as masterly, and its "emotion" we were told, was "refined," but the speech itself has not been laid before the followers of the party, and for the very good reason that it would do the party no service. Looking at the meeting held upon both sides, there can be no doubt that the victory is preponderatingly with the Opposition, and that, too, in the Province which is thought to be, and once was, the citadel of Ministerial strength.

Many stories are told of the cleverness of the Cossacks in obtaining what they need for themselves or their horses. Passing through the streets of Galatz recently, the thin, weary-looking horse of a Cossack fell suddenly and lay apparently lifeless on the ground. Its master began bawling the unhappy fate which had not only deprived him of a favourite, but left him horseless at the most interesting moment of the war. A crowd gathered around, and in it were several men who started a subscription to enable the soldier to procure another animal. Taking the money, and then removing the saddle from the horse, the Cossack wiped actual tears from his eyes, and went on his way. As the crowd were bending in pure sympathy over the stiffened horse, a whistle was heard at the other end of the street, the horse sprang to his feet, and with a joyful neigh hastened to join his shrewd master.

A New York paper says:—Is this a foreign country? Russia leather is made in Connecticut. Bordeaux wine is manufactured in California. French lace is woven in New York. Italian marble is dug in Kentucky. Marseilles linen is produced in Massachusetts. English cissimere is made in New Hampshire. Paris art-work comes from a shop in Boston. It is at length definitely announced that the Servians will join the Russian and Roumanian attacking forces. Their services will be required just now, for, as the dispatches indicate, disease is reducing the ranks of the invaders—doing even more than the Turks in that direction. The losses of the invaders appear to have been enormous of late. The reinforcements can scarcely fill the gaps.

It is related that at Wartrace, Tenn., a man on a sorry-looking mule rode up and shook hands with the President, saying: "I've rode ten miles this morning without any breakfast to take him by the head, and by gum, I've done it." At Atlanta, Ga., a little boy four years old mounted the platform just after the President had stopped speaking, and said: "Hello, Hayes!" The President smiled graciously upon the youngster and said: "How d'ye do, little one?"

### Miscellaneous News.

Apples are worth only two cents a bushel in North Carolina. It can't be an off year here.

Sixteen hundred sheep were sold lately in San Bernardino, Cal., for \$100, or 25 cents a head.

The St. Louis "Journal" thinks it's a singular coincidence: that the author of "Ten Years in Hell" celebrated his tin wedding about the time his book appeared.

Red River land that has been in cultivation one hundred years, produces ears of corn eighteen inches long and ten in circumference.

One bad result of female suffrage in Wyoming is said to be that the young men wickedly keep a record of the ages of unmarried spinsters who vote.

Mr. Ezekial Hawes thrashed on the farm of Wilson Patterson, near Marsville, the other day, 825 bushels of oats in 54 hours, the growth of 15 acres.

The long strike in the iron shipbuilding trade on the Clyde is estimated to have cost the workmen between \$350,000 and \$400,000 in wages lost since April.

A convention of bee-keepers is to be held in New York next week. There are said to be 150,000 of them in the country. They own 75,000,000,000 bees, and obtain 7,000,000 pounds of honey yearly.

The idea of a Bulgarian emigration to Canada is suggested by the Quebec Mercury. The Bulgarians are hardy and laborious, and many of the peasants are comparatively wealthy and would make as good settlers in the prairie of the Northwest as the Mennonites.

A remarkable phenomenon occurred near Little Stony Mountain, Manitoba, during a late thunder storm. What appeared to be a dense column of cloud struck the prairie with such violence as to make a large excavation in the earth about six feet deep.

The seal to the Bull of Pope Clement VII., whereby the title of "Defenders of the Faith" was conferred on King Henry VIII., is said to be in gold and is preserved in the Chapter House, London.

A negro preacher in Houston County, Ga., beat his little girl to death with a horse-whip, because she could not find a key, and carried the body off into the woods and buried it. He was arrested in the pulp and will probably be hung.

In Texas, recently, a Judge broke down with emotion while sentencing one Longly, a notorious desperado, to be hanged for murder. Longly was surprised at this, and remarked, on going back to jail, "I feel sorry for the Judge."

The United States Supreme Court had denied that life insurance companies are not liable in cases of suicide, if their policies contain a clause exempting them from responsibility in case the insured commits suicide, whether he be sane or insane.

A Syracuse despatch of the 9th inst. says that on Saturday last James Smith whipped his son, aged 14 years, to death in Williams-town, Oswego County. The body was hidden and has not yet been found. There is talk of lynching Smith, who is from Canada. He had previously been arrested for murder, but got clear.

All babies born in the Oneida (N. Y.) community are at once taken from their mothers and given to some other woman to nurse, and the babies are changed around so that no mother ever rears, or even knows, her own child. The object is to destroy all family feeling and to keep a woman from loving her own child better than anybody's else children.

A Chicago man's young wife entertained him with selections from Wagner, after which he expressed himself resigned to go to bed, where he slept very soundly. Towards midnight some cats assembled in the back yard and yelled frightfully. The sleeper did not get up and throw bootacks at them, but turned on one elbow and whispered it in his dreams, "Sing it once more. Ev'ing; sing it once more!" She sings it no more, neither anything else, but thinks of beating her piano into kindling wood and turning her music book into newspapers.

"What's in a name?" A good deal now and then. Mr. Partridge is a London Magistrate. A tinker was brought before him some time since charged with breaking the leg of a "game bird" with a stick. Mr. Partridge, moved, no doubt, by the name, sentenced him to three months' hard labor, immediately after a carman was brought up for calling out, "Whoa, Enema!" to a married woman, and when she "whoa!" knocking her down savagely. Him the judicial Partridge sentenced to two months' hard labor.

When a flea is made to appear as large as an elephant we can see all the wonderful parts of its formation, and are astonished to find that it has a coat of armor much more complete than ever warrior wore, and composed of strong polished plates, fitted over each other, each plate covered like a tortoise shell, and where they meet hundreds of strong quills project, like those on the back of the porcupine and hedge-hog. There is the arched neck, the bright eye, the transparent cases, the pierces to puncture the skin, a sucker to draw away the blood, six long jointed legs, four of which are folded on the breast, all ready at any moment to be thrown out with tremendous force, for that bothers one when they want to catch him, and at the end of each leg hooked claws to grasp what he lights upon.
