LET'S EAT

Cool Off With Soup

Spanish custard cream; hot or cold coffee or tea or milk. All measurements are level recipes proportioned to serve 4 to 6.

Spanish Custard Cream: Separate 3 eggs, dropping the yolks into a small double boiler.

Beat until creamy. Add 1 tbs. flour, 1/4 tsp. salt, fine-grated rind 1/4 lemon and 2 tbs. sugar. Mix thoroughly. Add 1 pt. milk.

Cook-stir over hot water about 7 min. or until the mixture coats the spoon.

Add 1/2 tbs. sherry flavoring. Beat 1 egg white stiff and pour in the custard. Half cool.

In a serving dish, arrange 6 crumbled macaroons. Add orange juice to moisten macaroons if they seem dry.

Spread with 1/2 c. any light-colored preserve. Spoon in the custard cream. Refrigerate. Top with whipped cream.

To be perfect, a dinner featuring fish should include tart foods, such as a salad and fruit.

Tomorrow's Dinner: Half-thaw frozen pineapple; broiled sword fish or haddock; parried potatoes; mashed summer squash; sliced tomatoes on lettuce; Tapio-croam with sliced peaches; hot or cold coffee or tea or milk.

Mashed Summer Squash: Wash, peel and pan-cook 2 lbs. of summer squash. Rub through a coarse sieve.

Add 2 tbs. butter, 1 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. each pepper, powdered dill and monosodium glutamate and 2 tbs. cream or undiluted evaporated milk. Beat until blended. Then reheat.

Suggestion of the Chef: This is the best way to peel tomatoes: Place in a bowl, pour in boiling water to cover, then pour it off immediately. The skin can be easily peeled off.

Short Coat Stars Napoleon Motifs Stylized

The Paris designer Saturday showed the profile line with interest centred in the front of the new fitted silhouette, subtly outlining the body.

Intricate shirred, gathered and draped treatments, starting from the neckline and worked throughout the bodice, are controlled by a naturally belted waistline.

Roomy fur-lined coats contrast the slender d. ses. Volume is centred throughout the shoulders with godets and inverted pleats called "chaubale pleats" lending ease to the back.

The short coat stars in all lengths from hi, through three-quarters and seven-eighths. Suits are easily fitted, buttoned high with yokes, giving width to the shoulders, and small turned-down or standaway collars. Neckties and small ascot scarves are tucked in necklines.

The silhouette widens in the cocktail dresses with shirred belted-skirt and draped bodices. Fantail pleats replace last season's flying panel treatments.

ANKLE-LENGTH TOO There are slim short fitted sheathes in fawn or velvets, and slender streamlined full-length dinner dresses.

The ankle-length dress, showing up all over Paris, is featured in the Patou evening picture. In the formal scene, there are also stoles and boleros of matching lace, cut velvets, or printed satin.

Napoleon III motifs of stylized medallions, floral bouquets, or squared geometrical embroideries, are featured for evening. A beige satin princess ball is studded with gold and diamond nail-heads.
