

### Fashion Releases Portray Trend Of Autumn Fashions

From Montreal, Que., comes the fashion news that the relaxed look of top fashion news for fall 1957, although there has been no sharp change in silhouette, the softening of line combined with the use of supple fabrics, gives an unmistakably "new look" — the first Canadian fall styles. This trend was revealed here for the first time today at the Fall Fashion Forum held at the Windsor Hotel, when buyers from all parts of Canada were shown a preview of the new styles.

The preview, 96 creations chosen from the Fashion Associates, Montreal, a group of the 12 top style houses in the fashion centre of Canada, revealed the trends in silhouette, fabric and color which will be most dominant this fall.

The trends are: **Silhouette** — With the exception of pleated skirts, the silhouette for daytime and evening fashions are also slim, but full skirts are new in shape and elegant in luxury fabrics.

The change in the silhouette is to a great extent in the relaxed, as-of-fit with dresses, jackets, blouses and evening fashions are also slim, but full skirts are new in shape and elegant in luxury fabrics.

**Skirts** — The softened look is achieved with new eased fullness draped from the Dutch Boy or flared line. The two-piece overalls fit is also accomplished by soft draping, fluid panels or bias cut. Pleated skirts appear with over-blouses, suit-like jackets or sweater-like tops. Full skirts or late-day and evening gowns, their new shape from softened folds, are draped or dome effects.

**Waistlines** — Waistlines are seen again at the normal position but too tightly constricted. The fit serves to emphasize eased fullness, either of the skirt on the bodice or both. The two-piece overblouse dress scarcely touches the body at the waistline and usually a not belted.

**Necklines** — Necklines generally stand away from the throat. Some are softly cuffed. Others hang to the back, the two-piece overblouse dress scarcely touches the body at the waistline and usually a not belted.

**Sleeves** — Sleeves appear in dresses for all hours of the day. The newest late-day dresses all have sleeves, mostly close fitting from short to wrist length.

**Hemlines** — For daytime wear, hem lengths remain unchanged but for cocktail and evening wear, they often appear shorter in front and longer in the back. An uneven

look is achieved with panels, drape and sashes.

**Chanel Inspiration** — Miss Helen Wilson, fashion merchandising expert declared that the Chanel influence of the twenties is by far the most outstanding in fashions for the coming season. Durability of the entire concept of fashion and new versions of her great successes have been adapted to the functional needs of today's woman. The fashions which bear the unmistakable Chanel signature of ease and comfort are the pleated skirts with sweater tops, the overblouses and open suit, the darkened reds and royal blues and the many chiffons of late day wear.

**Other Influences** — The two-piece dress is newest looking with an overblouse like those featured by Dior in his February collection. Ensembles are top fashion around the clock with jackets to waist or hip-bone length. Many of the smartest are collared in fur. The Asiatic influence first expressed by the Paris designers last spring can be seen in Oriental brocades, exotic colors, gelsa girl necklines, kimono sleeves, o b i sashes and slim-slim and harem skirts.

**Fabrics** — The softened look of the new silhouette can only be achieved with supple fabrics and these are the news for fall. Silk and wool and all their man-made likenesses are the basis of the supple fabrics which range in character from filmy chiffons to creeps of soufflé lightness. When crisp fabrics are used they are given the softness look by being combined with supple fabrics like chiffon, crepes or satins.

**Crepes** dominate the newly important afternoon dress. Chiffons, have been gaining momentum steadily and are a major supple fabric in the present being used along with in combination with everything from wool to crisp taffetas. Matte Jersey is another favorite supple fabric, competing with crepes in the afternoon field and starring in white for gala evenings. Tweeds in silk or man-made fibre blends are holding a year-round place in the dress field. Wool jerseys and wools with the Knitted Look are strong for fall. Wool crepe takes on new importance because of its draping ability.

**Color** — Black is the number one color for fall according to the Forum presentation. There are new color families accentuating the blacks though in a new range of deep but vivid blues, vibrant reds and browns in tobacco tones.

### Give Summer Furniture A Bright Coat Of Color

Preparing for outdoor leisure living, on porch, terrace or in the garden, is one of the joys of spring. Whether you are in the market for new pieces or refurbishing old ones, you'll note that color is paramount.

Clear reds, blues, greens and yellows that are found so often on the plain, sturdy chairs and benches are old favorites. On rattans, fabric colors of various greens and the perennially popular white, together with a wide selection of floral patterns, are again being shown.

High style paint colors of graceful wrought iron chairs and tables with glass, tile or marble tops are antique white, cream, dusty black, pastel blue, pale pink, aqua and coral.

**SOMETHING DIFFERENT**

If you are doing over some wrought iron pieces and would like to give the furniture a different and glamorous air, just sprinkle a little gold metallic powder on the newly painted iron surfaces before the paint has had a chance to dry.

Aluminum tube furniture is growing more popular each season and more so now that it can be had in attractive colors with matching or contrasting colored webbing.

Very likely, the bright spring days will inspire you to get after last years outdoor furniture and paint it some new lovely color. Make sure, first of all, that the surfaces are all clean and dry. After sanding off rust thoroughly, you must use a metal primer on the "bald spots" before applying a new finishing coat. **FILL ALL CRACKS**

Exterior enamel is the type of weather-resistant coating to specify—whether it's wood or metal you plan to paint for outdoor use. Flat enamel will give a dull finish for wrought iron, if that is what you desire.

Coating for new, unfinished wood pieces depends, of course, on the type of finish you prefer. Should you decide on a coat of color, first fill all cracks and nail holes with spackling material, then apply an enamel undercoat and, finally, the exterior enamel.

For a transparent coating on this type furniture, brush on two or three coats of tough and gleaming varnish.

**NO LUMPS**

Make sure the paint is free from lumps and that solids and liquids are thoroughly merged before you begin. It's a good idea to pour the paint into an empty can, for it's so easy to dip the brush into such a wide-mouthed, not-so-deep container.

Get everything together before tackling the job: Paints, brushes, container, stirring paddle, paint rags and paint brush cleaner.

And, while you're on the job, give the handles of your garden tools a colorful coat of paint, too.

"So when she asked me what birthday treat I'd like most to eat, I chose frog's legs. Oh boy!"

**Frog's Legs:** Frog's legs are generally sold today are frozen. Do not thaw. The preliminary preparation is as follows: Rinse with cold water, brush with lemon juice. Dust with salt and a sprinkle of thyme.

For 3 pairs frog legs, add 1 1/2 c. chicken stock or 1 1/2 c. water, and 1 1/2 chicken bouillon cubes. Simmer 12 min. or until almost fork-tender. Drain.

Use in either of the following ways:

**Broiled Frog's Legs:** Drain on absorbent paper. Brush with melted butter. Brown all over under the broiler. Serve with gravy made from the cooking liquid.

**Fried Frog's Legs:** Drain on absorbent paper. Brush with cream or slightly beaten egg. Dust with salt and pepper. Roll in fine dry crumbs and saute in butter or margarine. Serve plain or with mushroom sauce.

Meantime, measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well.

Add cooled sugar-shortening mixture and stir in 1 well-beaten egg and 1 tsp. lemon juice. Sift together twice 2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour and 1/4 tsp. ground mace. Stir into yeast mixture; beat until smooth. Work in 1 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour to make a very soft dough. Grease top of dough; cover; set in warm place, free from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough; cut out rounded spoonfuls of dough with a table-spoon; drop into greased muffin pans, filling each pan about half-full. Grease tops. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in a hot oven, 425°, about 20 minutes.

Yield — 20 medium-sized buns.
