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SANATORIA FOR CONSUMPTIVES

Extent of Consumption's Ravages.

SOMETHING OUGHT TO BE DONE
Dr. McNeill Advises Establishment of Sanatorium in Suitable Locality.

SIR.—Can anything be done in Charlottetown or Prince Edward Island to form an "anti-consumption league," as in Ontario and other places? It has been said that "consumption causes more than twice as many deaths as small-pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, measles and whooping cough put together," and reliable statistics all agree that consumption causes one death out of every eight from other causes—that of all people who die between the ages of 15 and 60, no less than 137 out of every 100 die of this disease. That between the ages of 25 and 35 nearly one-half is caused by consumption; that in this Dominion it claims each year no less than 9,000 victims.

Prof Koch's discovery of the tubercle bacillus in 1882 with subsequent scientific experiments and clinical experience in every civilized land has proved the following facts:—

1. That Consumption is not hereditary.
2. That it is a contagious disease.
3. That Consumption is produced by a germ introduced into the body from without by inhaling minute dried particles of the sputa floating in the air, and by food, especially milk from tuberculous cattle.
4. That in advance stages of disease millions of these germs are thrown off in the sputa each day by a single individual.
5. That consumption is preventable and curable.

The rich can protect themselves, but what about the poor of Charlottetown and P. E. Island. An anti-consumptive league should be formed at once. An appeal should be made to the benevolent and charitable to come to the rescue of the people—to protect the public and to give to our children a land in which consumption will be an unknown disease. In order to remove the fears of some it is well to say that "sanatoria" are homes scientifically arranged with the advantages of fresh air and proper food, etc., under medical guidance in such a way that the patient will have the best chance for health, and at the same time to keep the contagious element under control. By forming a provincial or city association in this Province, one can become affiliated with a Dominion association on similar lines for holding a Dominion Congress which will meet, say next year, that is, if we follow the wake of the other Provinces now leading in this matter.

In the Province of Ontario, there is a private sanatorium at Gravenhurst—has a beautiful location and a fine building. There is a man in this city under treatment, and in order to save him he should be at once removed to a sanatorium, but unfortunately he nor his friends have not the means to send him to Gravenhurst in Ontario. There are many localities near this city that could be utilized if the public would arouse themselves to realize that public effort must be put forth to save those now in health as well as those afflicted. We need not go very far inland for a suitable valley or hill where in fine weather the air is bracing and pure; and a sanatorium should be started on a small scale to test the matter and give the afflicted a chance.

A Provincial Board of Health should be formed, or the city Board of Health might take the initiative in this matter and pass rules and regulations for the guidance of patients and households. It ought to be my opinion to form an association to combat tuberculosis in the city of Charlottetown. Government and municipal aid might be obtained, supplemented by the people through churches, societies, etc. Who will volunteer to inaugurate a public meeting in this behalf and make a commencement in this matter? I appeal to the press and to the churches to arouse public opinion in behalf of the consumptives of this City and Province.
