TRACED TO ONE DAIRY.—A Toronto despatch says: The medical officer has traced eighty cases of scarlet fever, which has been epidemic here, to customers of one dairy. The owner was instructed to discontinue supplying milk within the city.

CONTEST FORBIDDEN.—A New York despatch says: The exhibition sparring bout between Robert Fitzsimmons and John L. Sullivan did not take place. Martin Julian announced that the police had forbidden the contest.

CHURCH DESTROYED.—A church at Jonquiere, Lake St. John district, Que., was destroyed by fire on Sunday. The flames were caused by lightning, which struck the altar, at high mass, destroying it and stunning the priest. In the panic one man was killed and many more were injured.

THEY'RE SHOOTING WELL.—The Toronto Telegram's special cable from London says: The Canadian Bisley team is putting in some good practice daily at the Runnymede ranges near Staines. They are becoming better acquainted with the Lee-Netford, and are shooting well, so well indeed, that they are surprising themselves. It is understood that this year the unprecedented number of 12 teams will shoot for the Kolapore cup.

THE OPERA HOUSE.—The attendance at the Opera House last evening was not so large as was expected because of attractions elsewhere. But the company gave a very artistic rendering of that cleverly-written melodrama, "A Legal Wrong," and everyone seemed well pleased. Miss Tucker played the part of Helen Wilton splendidly, and she was well supported by Mr. Meldon, Mr. Richards and the other characters in the cast. The motion pictures were clearer than on the previous evening and "took" well. Between the acts Miss Vivian gave several vocal selections in a captivating way, and was deservedly encored. The singing of Baby Vavene was also greatly enjoyed, and in response to a triple encore the little one danced a sailor's horn-pipe very cleverly indeed. This afternoon the favorite comedy-drama "Queenie" is the attraction at the matinee, and to-night, "If You Must Lie Tell a Good one" will be played. This is said to be the comedy success of the year—one long series of laughs. Give Miss Tucker and her company a full house.

AT KINDERGARTEN HALL.

Miss Biggart was greeted, at Kindergarten Hall, last evening, by a small but literary audience, expectant of a literary treat. And they were not disappointed. Miss Biggart, in her impersonation of some of the characters of Adam Bede gave a new interest to those who had been fortunate enough to have read the book, and to those who had not had that pleasure she imparted a desire to become familiar with this and all of George Eliot's works. She selected some of the most striking parts of the great novel, and with the addition of a few explanatory remarks gave the delighted audience a comprehensive grasp of the whole story. In the proposal of Seth to Dinah, in the trial scene, and in the dialogue between Hester and Dinah in the dark prison cell, she was probably at her best and held her audience in rapt attention. What was chiefly noticeable in this highly-talented lady was her very correct renderings of the peculiar dialect of most of the speakers, especially that of Adam Bede, himself. She could adapt her voice to the gruff bass of the latter as well as to the high treble of Hester. Undertaking to dramatize this, one of the greatest novels of the century,—and it would be hard to find a more difficult task,—Miss Biggart is to be congratulated on her great success. Following this, the most pleasing feature of the evening, Miss Aimee Cecil Jones and her pupils exhibited that grace of movement which is the outcome of careful training under the Delsarte system. First Miss Jones herself very beautifully illustrated the song "Rock of Ages" which was sung behind the scenes by Mr. Fred Davies. Then eight young ladies gaily dressed as gondoliers appeared and went through various graceful and pleasing evolutions and lastly Miss Jones appeared again as the frost maiden in the dawn and moonlight. God Save the Queen closed this very enjoyable entertainment.
