Orval Gravelle robbed Moncton goalie Nick Pidsodny of a shut-out just a second before the end of the game when he batted home a loose puck.

Tod Campeau gave Hawks, Maritime champions, a 1-0 margin in the second period. Bill Sinnett and Dewar Thomson also shot second-period tallies, and Sinnett fired his second late in the third to complete Hawks' scoring.

Forum Is Scene Of Peace As Habs Whip New York

MONTREAL (CP)—Five hundred policemen stood guard at the Montreal Forum Saturday night as Montreal Canadiens whipped New York Rangers 4-2 in a National Hockey League game that produced nothing in the way of a recurrence of Thursday's riot.

Not even a peanut was tossed, in direct contrast to Thursday when irate fans showered NHL president Clarence Campbell with everything from programs to tomatoes in protest of the suspension of Maurice Rockett. Rockett, Campbell did not attend, at the request of Forum officials. The crowd of 13,540 was the smallest here since 1947—also because of a Forum order forbidding the sale of standing-room tickets.

Police began patrolling outside the rink long before game time. Anyone seen loitering on nearby streets was told to move along and only those with tickets were allowed in the Forum lobby.

POLICE TOOK OVER

Inside, other policemen took over and hustled the fans into their seats, preventing a jam in the lobby. Thursday's demonstrators congregated there, and when they were forced outside, began pelting the rink with ice and bottles.

Saturday, police also were stationed near the main entrance to the rink where the Forum's 200,000 capacity was set off and sent spectators coughing and choking through the exits. They had nothing to do but watch the game, however.

The victory moved Montreal into a first-place tie with Detroit Red Wings.

Richard, sitting out a suspension for the rest of the season and the playoffs, also saw his chance to win his first scoring championship vanish. Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion fired a goal and assisted on two others to move one point ahead of the Rockett in the scoring race. Jean Beliveau stayed in the running with a goal and an assist that left him two points behind Geoffrion.

EARLY LEAD

Montreal built up its winning margin before the game was three minutes old. Harry Howell, Rangers' star, was penalized for holding 32 seconds after the game got under way and Floyd Curry finished off a neat passing play with Calum Mackay and Geoffrion at 1:06 to give Montreal the lead.

Before Howell returned, Mackay scored from a scramble in front of the New York goal. Midway through the period Geoffrion beat Gump Worsley on a wicked drive.

Red Wings Trounce Canadiens 6-0 For Ch'ship; Sawchuk Wins Vezina Trophy

DETROIT, (CP)—Detroit Red Wings rolled to their seventh straight National Hockey League championship Sunday night, soundly thumping Montreal Canadiens 6-0, with little Ted Lindsay leading the onslaught with three goals.

The well-ballyhooed game, following the forfeited affair in the riot-beset Montreal Forum Thursday, was the deciding game for the league title. It was an unprecedented situation. Everything rode on the outcome as the two teams were tied on points before they started Sunday night.

Red Wings weren't to be denied and the shutout for tall Terry Sawchuk earned him the Vezina trophy over Harry Lumley of Toronto Maple Leafs by a single goal.

Red Wings had plenty of spirit and dash and almost from the outset the handwriting was on the wall for the Montrealers. Wings counted only once in the opening period but they struck with a vengeance in the second period, a bruising, bumping battle that brought the Wings five goals.

Dutch Reibel, Tony Leswick and Alex Delvecchio rounded out Lindsay's hat trick to complete the rout of the Canadiens.

The Montrealers were subjected to terrific speed and solid checking almost throughout the first two periods. They managed to get an offensive going late in the middle frame when everybody was sent up but they couldn't beat the agile Sawchuk who turned in one of his greatest games.

By winning Red Wings will meet Toronto in one half of the Stanley Cup finals starting Tuesday, while Canadiens meet the Boston Bruins in the other half.

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs broke out in a scoring splurge Saturday night to whip the last-place Chicago Black Hawks 5-4 in a National Hockey League game and take the third playoff spot for the Stanley Cup semi-final series.

The playoffs start Tuesday night.

At the same time, Leafs netminder Harry Lumley recorded his eighth shutout of the season and maintained a two-goal edge over Detroit's Terry Sawchuk in the race for goaltending's highest award, the Vezina Trophy.

Although it was an unspectacular performance, the sellout crowd of 12,826 fans got a big kick out of it.

The second game will be at Halifax Monday and the survivor will enter Memorial Cup play against the Quebec winner.

North Sydney's hard-skating Bomber Andrea fired five of his team's eight goals and got three of the 21 penalties that marked the torrid clash. John Coleman got two goals and Frank McDougall fired the other.

Halifax defenceman Jim Lahay drew a 10-minute misconduct. Franklins forward Aubrey Gouthro was heaved out of the game following a fight in the third period.
