Flight Schedule To Change Friday

Islanders will not be taking any early-morning flights from the Charlottetown Airport, starting Friday.

With the establishment of MCA's new flight plan, all flights will originate from Moncton, with 11 a.m. scheduled as the earliest flight from Charlottetown. The old 6 a.m. flight will be replaced by one at 8 p.m.

The changeover will also involve the transfer of 11 Island employees of MCA to Moncton. The staffs of the accounts office and of the Charlottetown and Summerside airports will remain on the island.

The two Dart-Herald aircraft, which are responsible for the flight change, will arrive at MCA at two months, a spokesman for the company said yesterday.

The modern aircraft have a smooth, vibration-free flight and can carry almost twice as many passengers as the DC3's.

Crop insurance applications to date have not been as numerous as expected. Mr. MacLaine noted that applications for part coverages have been received but in all cases are rejected. "It must be all or nothing," he stated.

The minister noted that potato dealers selling fertilizer may persuade some growers to apply for insurance, and these applications may be left to the last minute, he said.

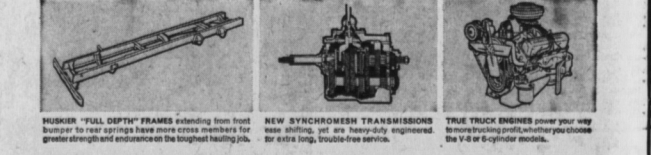
