This year's crop of beauties is simply out of this world and when you see them if you think you are dreaming then just pray you never wake up. But no one will be dreaming when the girls go forth in their colorful racing uniforms to wave happily from their convertibles at a wildly applauding crowd as they wind their way through city streets.

The fantastic prelude to the greatest racing attraction of the season Friday night August 20 is a tremendous show all in itself—the annual Gold Cup and Saucer Parade that morning has now become a fixture in the life of Islanders and tourists.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says thunderstorms were reported in various parts of the Maritimes Tuesday evening as the leading edge of cooler and drier air advanced from Quebec. Once again fog had moved in along the South Shore of Nova Scotia and the Bay of Fundy coast of New Brunswick. The cooler and drier air will continue its advance into the Maritimes today with clearing conditions expected in New Brunswick during the afternoon and evening hours. In the other two provinces, it should remain cloudy with scattered showers for much of the day.

Annapolis Valley, Northern Nova Scotia, Eastern Shore, Cape Breton, Prince Edward Island: Cloudy with scattered showers ending this evening. Turning much cooler and less humid. **New Post Offices Open On Island**

Postal officials in Charlottetown yesterday announced the opening of two new post offices in the province, one in Murray Harbor and the other in North Rustico and also that two others are scheduled to open within the next few weeks, the locations of these latter was not revealed.

At Murray Harbor the post office is now located in the new building erected by the department of public works.

The new postmaster is Whitney Brehaut who succeeds J. E. Robertson who recently resigned from the postal department.

At North Rustico moving of postal facilities is scheduled to take place today, and will also go into the recently completed public works building.

Mrs. Geneva Gauthier who has been with the department for several years will continue as postmistress in the new location.

**Taxi Drivers Charged With Liquor Selling**

SUMMERSIDE — Four Summerside taxi drivers were each charged with illegal sale of liquor in Prince County Court yesterday before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald. Charged were: Allison Mills, Donald Joseph Gallant, Louis Joseph Gallant and John Joseph Morrison. The accused whose cases have been adjourned to August 17 will be represented by Allison Gillis of Charlottetown.

John Joseph MacQuirk of Spring Valley pleaded not guilty to the charge of obstructing Const. Vernon Reeves of Kensington and had his case adjourned. He was represented by G. Bruce MacDonald.

Lloyd Oliver of Summerside pleaded not guilty to selling liquor and also to failing to stop following an accident. The cases were adjourned to August 16. He is represented by G. Bruce MacDonald on the latter charge.

Earl Atkinson pleaded not guilty to failing to stop at a yield sign and had his case adjourned to August 12.

Ingham Keir Bryanton pleaded not guilty to driving a motor vehicle with insufficient equipment and had his case adjourned to August 12. Mrs. Mary Gallant was fined \$10 and costs or five days for driving a motor vehicle when she was not the holder of a driver's license.

Charles Henry Cole and Robert Joseph Campbell were each fined \$10 and costs or five days for driving motor vehicles with insufficient equipment.

John William Folland was fined \$10 and costs or five days for making a left turn on the road when it was unsafe to do so.

Steven Seville was given a similar fine for making a right turn and not being as close to the road side as necessary.

Joseph Perry pleaded not guilty to a charge of failing to yield the right of way and had his case adjourned to August 12. Ivan James Mill of New Annan charged with failing to surrender a suspended driver's license had his case adjourned to August 24.

Wayne Allan Bowley, RCMP Station pleaded not guilty to a charge of failing to register a motor vehicle and had his case adjourned to August 12.

Keith Robert Foy of Victoria pleaded not guilty to driving a motor vehicle which was not equipped with brakes and had his case adjourned to August 12. It was incorrectly reported in last week's court story that Foy had paid a fine of \$10 on this charge.

Three persons were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days on charges of illegal possession of liquor. Joseph Patrick LaBobe of Lennox Island charged with having liquor.

the federal government that there would be any changes in this year's procedure of administering student loans. A member of the provincial loans committee said, however, that applications for loans this year will be more searching than last year so that loans can be better granted on the basis of student need.

Applications are now coming in to the loan committee from students and it is expected to be the end of the month before requested loan amounts are totalled to see if a ceiling below the \$1,000 maximum is necessary.

**Student Loan Allocation Same As 1964 For Island**

Once again this year the Canada Student Loan Plan allocation for the Island students preceding past the high school level has been set at \$232,000. Last year this amount proved inadequate and the provincial government asked for and received an increase.

The department of education here, however, is proceeding on the assumption that the 1965 allocation will remain at \$232,000. For this reason, the P.E.I. Canada Student Loans Committee

may apply a downward scaling of loans if by Sept. 1 the total loans applied for exceed the allocation of the province. Loans of a maximum of \$1,000 per student per year were to be given when the loan plan was started.

Last year, a number of students had to take loans of less than \$1,000 but when more funds were allocated by federal authorities the amounts of the loans were raised.
